Dear Friend

I write this, having just watched the Primary 3 children of Garrowhil Primary enact in story and song, the death and resurrection of Jesus for their Easter Service in Mure Memorial Church. I had been thinking about the theme of this letter for a while, however the wonderful acting of the young girl who played Caiaphas sold me on the need to commit my thoughts to the written word. She went ballistic as she berated Jesus and his relative silence before him and the suggestion that He (Jesus) was putting words into his (Caiaphas') mouth. The wildness and venom with which the young actress spat out the words into the face of Jesus, underscored what I had been thinking for a while. Jesus was killed, crucified, because of religion. This religion is universal. It knows no boundaries. It is universal because it lies in the darkened heart of humanity. It subverts the true aims of any faith and twists it into a horrible counterfeit. Where true faith promotes love, this religion promotes exclusivism and blame. Where faith promotes simplicity and humility, the counterfeit is ornate and proud. Where faith serves the poor, the counterfeit blames the poor. Where faith is full of humour, the counterfeit is self-righteously unsmiling. Where faith cultivates freedom, the false religion is legalistic. Where faith calls for the growth and fulfilment of the human spirit, the false religion suppresses and enslaves the individual. Where faith calls for risk and the spirit of adventure, the false religion is based on fear and suspicion. Most of all, where faith

embraces and forgives the sinner, the false religion accuses and blames the sinner. The inspiration, even revelation, I had with the young actress was that she wore a lovely pink ribbon in her hair and a pink top under the loose fitting bed sheet that was Caiaphas' outfit. It under lined for me the way in which religion is delivered so devastatingly oppressive, while dressed as something so sweet, so nice, and so sincere, butter wouldn't melt in their mouths. How often have we been enticed by such a people? But when the chips are down, how horrible these sweet, angelic "messengers" of God become, "Crucify Him! Crucify Him!" in an irrational and hate-filled rant at Jesus who had done nothing wrong to anyone, yet who in simple loving and caring actions had won the popularity stakes, crossing the religious leadership of the day and undermining their own selfappointed status and so-called expertise. Theologian of the Second World War, Dietrich Bonheoffer, who saw this in the church that supported Hitler talked often of the need for a religionless Christianity – a Christianity without the trappings of privilege or status or expertise, just a community of people who cared and shared in the name of Jesus. I can't help but feel the same way in seeing how the so-called "evangelical church" is falling in behind to support Donald Trump's attempt to become President of the United States. Friends let's keep our faith simple. Let's

not become too arrogant in our believing.

Let us rather show humility, love, openness and forgiveness, and hope and pray that people will see through the charlatans within our faith, and indeed all faiths, and find the true road to peace, justice and the kingdom of God in the crucified and risen Christ.

Presbytery Report

For our March meeting we were back at Pollokshields Church. Our guest speaker was Angela Molloy who is the Project Manager at Church House, one of the Projects supported by Presbytery. This was started in 1942 when £400 was donated to put heat and light into an old church building in Bridgeton to create a meeting place for young boys. They are now working with the fourth generation of some families and while originally they worked with children they are now beginning to focus their work on families. They are known locally as "Churchy" and 2015 had been another significant year for "Churchy". In mid-October work started on building a new annexe onto Bridgeton, St. Francis-in-the-East Church to rehouse Church House, thanks to funding from the Scottish Government and the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland. Their core weekly groups are a P6&7 group, the Parent and Toddler group and P1-3 and followed by a P4&5 group. In these groups the young people have the opportunity to try various activities

including cooking, baking, arts and crafts, sports, games, team building exercises etc. They aim to provide as many new experiences and opportunities for the young people as possible. As they progress towards working with families, instead of only young people, they have offered baby massage classes and cooking for parents. They aim to increase their activities over the next year in their new building which should be finished by Summer 2016.

The Business Committee reported that, following the decision of our Presbytery Clerk Bill Hewitt, to move to a half time post with effect from 1st July, it was recommended that Graham Blount, who is at present the minister at St Enoch's Hogganfield, be appointed to share the post. This was given Presbytery approval The Ministry Committee had invited Jonathan Fleming to address Presbytery about his work as Glasgow Presbytery Vocations Champion. (You may remember Jonathan taking a service at Mure Memorial shortly after he had completed his probationary year and before he took up his charge at Erskine.) He explained that his role was to act as a sign post to anyone who felt that they have a calling to ministry. He recalled that, when he had felt a call, he was unsure where to go for advice and he now regarded it as a great honour to have been given the opportunity to be in a position to be there for others and to help them on their journey. Doug Gay from Glasgow University had set a challenge to the Church to have 30 people

going through training each year and, following the success of the "Tomorrow's Calling" programme, we now have 31 this year. Jonathan spoke of the exciting opportunities that came with the position of being a minister and he was delighted and encouraged to see the 13 people who were then presented by the convener of the Ministry Committee as Candidates and Probationers currently under the care of Glasgow Presbytery.

The Mission Committee intimated that they are looking at providing training for congregations or small groups of people who are interested in working as a new mission initiative team in the many new-build areas around Glasgow Presbytery. Training will start in September 2016 and will be a year long spare time course.

The Learning and Nurture Committee introduced Iona Kimmitt who is a Vocations Volunteer working with Maryhill Parish Church. She is part of a scheme which was set up by the Church of Scotland for 18 to 25 year olds who have any inclination or calling to work with the Church. She shares a flat with three other volunteers who work within Presbytery.

The convener of the World Mission Committee spoke about the "Let us Build a House – Nepal Project" which we at Mure Memorial have been supporting over the last few weeks and, hopefully by the time you are reading this, we will have raised the £500 needed to build a new earthquake resistant home for a family in Nepal.

Their Trustees had considered our application for funding and advised us to come back once we had raised one third, which we have now done. We hope that they will look favourably on our application.

We continue to look for your support practically, financially and prayerfully.


