Dear Friends,

It was on the 17<sup>th</sup> December 1843 that Charles Dicken's novel "A Christmas Story" was published, more often seen today as a film. In the story the wealthy business man Scrooge is asked to make a donation to the poor at Christmas time. He refuses saying that he can't afford to make idle people happy. His dead ex-partner then sends three ghosts to Scrooge. The first as Christmas past reminds Scrooge of the happiness he could have had had he made different choices. The second ghost of Christmas present shows Scrooge of the happiness first of his nephew, and then of his employee Bob Cratchit despite being poor, even with Bob having a disabled child named Tiny Tim. The ghost of Christmas yet to come takes Scrooge on a journey to his future -the sacking of Bob Cratchit, and without income Tim dies, and a visit to his own death and graveside where there is no-one to mourn him, but he is offered the opportunity to make it better if he can change his ways. The next day is Christmas Day and Scrooge wakens up as a different man, going to the Cratchit's to announce a pay rise for Bob, and Tim prays a blessing on him. Scrooge decides to live in a more positive and cheerful way and finds happiness for the future.

Having just listened to the Chancellor's Autumn Statement retaining tax credits for the low paid, and looking forward to Black Friday, when many of the big stores have massive discounts in the lead up to Christmas which leads to people fighting over the goods on sale, I can't help but feel we have learned very little in the 172 years since the book was written.

Being rich does not bring happiness; You can be happy with little - "enough is as good as a feast"

True happiness comes with sharing, And the poorest of the poor can ask God for a blessing for the richest of the rich.

So let's use this Christmas season to check our priorities, to seek to bring happiness, not just to friends and family, but also those we know are there but simply pass them by. Let's reach out and bring a blessing on those who are different from us, those who are more needy than us. We do this not in memory of a book written 172 years ago, but in memory of a child born 2,015 years ago in a humble stable, visited by shepherds and kings, coming to bring true joy to all – Immanuel, God is with us.

Have a truly Joyous Christmas, and the Happiest of New Years. Malcolm

# **Sweet Christmas**



A girl called Mary heard a WISPA, from an angel (wearing a HALO) who said that she would be the Mother of God's son. But how could this be? She was not yet married to Joseph. To have a baby now would be a TOPIC of conversation in the village. Joseph also heard of God's plan, but before the baby arrived, political events overtook them -Joseph had to return to Bethlehem for the census – it was miles away – a MARATHON (Snickers) journey, but Joseph thought the BREAK would do her good. When they arrived, Joseph tried to find lodgings, but CLUB after CLUB let them down - No room they all said. Eventually they were offered a little out house – it was there that the little baby was born. He was named Jesus, which means Saviour. He was laid in a manger, lined with hay and STRAW (Sherbet straw!)

That night, some shepherds, and DRIFTERS, heard TUNES in the sky. "Glory to God in the Highest". The shepherds decided to take a break (KIT- KAT) from looking after the sheep. No it was a special STAR (bar) signalling the birth of a King. They travelled long and hard and reached Herod's Palace they were embarrassed to HOBNOB with royalty. # Church Gift Day

The Finance Committee wishes to thank all those who contributed to the church funds at the recent Gift Day. We also thank the ladies who provided the refreshments – these were much appreciated by all who attended.

At the time of writing this report, the sum realised is £5550, which includes the element added under the Gift Aid scheme. Members of the committee are sometimes asked why it is necessary to request such extra donations from time to time. This is easily answered.

£100,000 is needed every year to run our church and many of the items of expenditure are outwith our control, thus presenting a challenge for us to meet our commitments. Our main items this year are

We were extremely pleased (and, indeed, relieved) to accept this most generous offer and wish to extend our sincere thanks to both organisations for a wonderful gift which benefits the entire congregation and all our friends who make use of our buildings.

We hope this explanation is helpful to readers and illustrates the difficulties faced by the Finance Committee and Board of Management in monitoring and controlling our church's finances.

#### **A Life Changing Restaurant**

Debritu Abebe lives in the beautiful town of Arbaminch, 500 km south of Addis Ababa. The town is part of the great Ethiopian rift valley which cuts the country into two. The climate is generally hot and humid throughout the year.

Debritu's family lived in a very small room only 3m x 3m. Their combined income from her husband's daily labourer job and from baking and selling injera was hardly enough to feed the family or send their four children to school.

In 2008, a neighbour told Debritu about the benefits of self help groups and encouraged her to join one. Debritu was skeptical about the idea of being able to change her life without any outside help but she decided to give it a go, and joined a group called Be'emnet, meaning 'By Faith'.

As well as saving money together, group members receive training on saving and loans, income generating activities and basic business skills. With the first loan she received from her group, Debritu expanded her injera business and started supplying two local company canteens. But the companies then moved to another city, and the sudden loss of business affected her income in a huge way. She tried her best, but the amount of money she earned and the time and energy she spent did not match.

In spite of this struggle, she repaid the loan and took another one to start-up a mini restaurant in her one room house. She later received permission from the local government to build an extra room on land behind her house and used further loans to increase her capital and diversify her menu. She hired four people as cooks and waitresses and business is flourishing. Debritu has named her restaurant, 'Shempa Asha' which means, 'Life Changing'.

Debritu paid for her husband to get his driving licence and he left his daily labourer job and now works as an assistant for long distance drivers. Her children are well fed and receiving proper education and their house is now well furnished.

She says, 'You would not see my family as we are now if I hadn't joined the self help group. We could have divorced long ago because of survival quarrels. My self help group maintained my marriage and my family is not only surviving but also thriving.'

With great enthusiasm, Debritu describes her self help group as a family, and she gives credit to the support of church facilitators and the church. 'They always showed genuine encouragement for what I was doing, and the training they provided has helped me to be successful in my business'.

Debritu believes that it is better to help and empower people to support themselves instead of making them dependent, and she says, 'If a person is stuck down a hole, it is much better to give them rope than to give them bread'.



I would like to express my thanks to the Church Family at Mure Memorial who helped me celebrate the big '90' on Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> November.

A particularly big thanks to the ladies who organised, prepared, and served the food.

# Mure Access Project

We have now been informed by Presbytery's Property Committee that we have been granted permission, in principle, to go ahead with our new Project. This will allow us to create new disabled access at both church and hall levels on the Grove side of the building. We also plan to install disabled toilets at both levels, replace the lift, which is no longer able to be repaired, and install a chair lift on the stairs. We will create a bigger, and much needed disabled parking area on the far side of the building. Toilets will also be installed in the vestibule at the main doors of the church, something we have discussed for many years, and a small kitchen facility will be created in the vestibule. Much of this work is essential if we are to comply with legislation relating to public buildings being compliant under the Disability Discrimination Act.

It is now up to us, as a congregation, to raise the money that is needed to complete the works. The figure which the Board has put on the total project is £270,000. The committee has been very busy trying to source money from various grant agencies and have already made several applications. You have already heard about our appeal for votes for the Co-op local Fund.

We are also looking at various ways to fundraise, locally. We have Calendars and Christmas Cards to sell as well as shopping bags. There are envelopes now available if you wish to donate on a weekly basis. Another way of giving is through our "TEN for TEN" Scheme. We are asking people to commit to giving £10.00 a month (you can make it more if you feel able) for ten months by standing order. If you are able to sign a Gift Aid form and haven't already done so, please ensure you fill one in.

And here is another way you can help which Douglas has set up for us. Doing any On-Line Shopping? Well the church has a way in which you can raise funds for the MAP, and do your on-line shopping - all from the comfort of your house! You need to register at

www.easyfundraising.org.uk and search for Mure Memorial Church. This will then ask you to download an application to the tool bar that will remind you each time you visit a supporting website. A full list of retailers is available on EasyFunding, but here is a small selection of retailers you could use; John Lewis, Marks and Spencer, Halfords, Argos, AA Breakdown

and JustEat, which covers many local carry out suppliers. There are lots more retailers and these deals last throughout the year, without costing you any more money!

If you can give your support by any of these means and want further information, please speak to any member of the committee. We will also be pleased to hear about any fundraising ideas which you may have. We ask you to keep the project and the committee in your prayers.
