Letter from our Interim Minister

Hello everyone

I am delighted that we have a Link off the ground before Christmas.

A huge thank you to the folk who took this on – it is great to have a way of communicating with church members and with our community.

Autumn has been a busy time. I continued getting to know both congregations – I'm quite good on faces now but still getting names muddled.

Ann started her pastoral work with us in October.

There have been a whole host of different kinds of

services.

The liaison group had its first meeting (this is the group where representatives of both Mure Memorial and

St Andrews can meet and talk about matters of shared

interest). At the first meeting the groups discussed the pattern of advent and Christmas services, the discussion was relayed to the Kirk Sessions and from that a good and smoothly ordered programme of Christmas services have been arranged.

December begins with communion on the first Sunday, the 1st of December. The gift service is the following Sunday.

The Nativity Service is on the Sunday before Christmas and plans are already underway for that.

On Christmas Eve the watchnight service is being held in St. Andrews this year. The service starts at 11.15pm. I hope as many folks as possible attend for all are welcome.

On Christmas morning there will be a service at 10.30am in Mure Memorial with St. Andrew's folk joining us for that.

I am very pleased that this smooth pattern of services was achieved with discussion and goodwill all round.

In the New Year we will have a meeting of both

congregations with the Transition Support Group for the interim ministry. This group which has representatives from Ministries Council, Presbytery and one of the other Interim ministers facilitates a meeting of church members so that aims and objectives for the interim ministry can be worked out. It is also the group which will be able to say when the interim ministry is finished and ask presbytery to restore your right to call a minister.

I hope that we can have this meeting towards the end of January – so more about it, I hope, in the next magazine.

JAMCLUB

Our members started meeting again in September. There are currently about 14 children on the roll, although we are always happy to accommodate "visiting" children. We are also keen for new members to join us.

In the summer three of our longstanding leaders stepped down. Between them, Jean Russell, Aileen Thornton and Helen Stewart had given about 125 years in service as Sunday School teachers. Quite an achievement! Their contribution was recognised by the Church in June.

Currently we have one leader in Jamclub with the parents taking turns to work with the leader. However we do need others to come forward to continue this ministry to the children. The Bible class leader John Birkinshaw will now resume this role when his work commitments allow.

In Jamclub we use material from the ROOTS programme to provide a focus for each session. This has recently involved us looking at some of the letters Paul wrote. After reflecting on the lesson each week the children then play games, do quizzes, arts and crafts and even occasionally sing! We have decided to continue next year following the ROOTS syllabus.

Our members are getting excited about Christmas and are looking forward to the Advent season and all the preparations and celebrations to follow.

The Juniors have been looking at their bible knowledge, making crafts, playing games and learning about the importance of the food bank.

The Brigaders have also been learning about the food bank, making crafts and learning about and taking part circuit training as part of their health and well being.

In October a coach of 54 went to Deep Sea World North Queensferry. A great time was had by all and you can see some pictures of what we got up to on the wall in the big hall.

November sees the annual trip for the Juniors to entertain the patrons of Baillieston Care Home for St Andrews Day, entertainment with a Scottish theme, then in December the Explorers will visit the care home to put on a Christmas concert - something we are all looking forward to and enjoy every year. For our fundraising this year the Juniors and Brigaders have decided to support the local food bank. On Wednesday 4th December from 6:30pm till 8pm we are having a Christmas Carol evening serving tea, coffee and cake. We will also have a few Christmas crafts on sale. A little different from normal we are not having an entry fee for this event: the ask is for a donation towards the food bank, men's toiletries, cereal, tins of soup etc...All are welcome to come along and join us on this evening and we look forward to seeing you there supporting the girls as they entertain you, they are practising hard. Come along in your festive jumpers if you wish, there will also be a chance for you to join in the singing as we go through the old favourites!
