Dear Friends,

As we approach Christmas, we remember how God's love became Incarnate, how it took on flesh in Jesus of Nazareth, the Jesus who was the one promised long ago by God, the Jesus, whose coming John the Baptist was told he could recognize in the acts that he performed, by the fact that through him: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them.

We remember how God's love is meant to become incarnate in us, how it is meant to take on flesh in those who call upon his name.

People will know that we are Christians, not by the number of bibles we own, not by the number of church services we go to, not by the fact that we pray or say grace at meal times, nor even by the fact we tell others that we believe in Jesus Christ, though all of these things are of greater or lesser importance in letting others know we are Christians.

No, in the end, people will know that we are Christians by our love, by how we allow God's love for us, God's love in us, to take on flesh and get acted out. "If we love one another", the Apostle John says, "God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us." If we love one another God's joy will come upon us and, as we share it with others, it will come upon them.

How does God's love take on flesh, how does it become concrete and specific, in us? How do we love one another? Especially how do we love those ordinary people who exist all around us, but for the most part are not seen by the rest of the world, or if seen are ignored by almost everyone but the closest members of their families?

The blind, the lame, the leprous and the diseased, the deaf, the spiritually dead, and perhaps most of all, the poor, the ones to whom Jesus brought good news, the ones whom he fed on the mountain side? Will they know we are Christians?

Will they see that God has once again taken on human form, that his love is incarnate now, as it was so long ago when Jesus told John the Baptist's messengers how to recognize the servant of God, the Messiah?

The gifts we give, for the poor and the unfortunate, the offering we make to God, is a beginning in helping others to know, an important beginning. May God bless us with the wisdom and with the will to take the next step and the ones after that.

Our love is in God and in his son Jesus Christ. Like hope, peace, and joy, love is a gift from God. It overtakes us and fills us when we remember what God has done and what he has promised to do.

God does not choose to use power to overwhelm us; rather God uses the most compelling possible strategy, being born as a human being, to lead us back to our loving creator. Nothing else would have or could have worked. Those who wrote the Gospels saw that, and used the birth narrative to illustrate this truth. True, they each wrote about it from different perspectives, but the account of Joseph, Mary, the shepherds and the wise men is more than a charming story.

That is the miracle, the Good News prevailing. This is the time when we can shed our resistance anew, and find that simple things like a birth in a manger matter more than anything.

Christmas is the time when heaven and earth are joined in a glorious way, with human beings at the centre of the joint. This is the time when "the hopes and fears of all the years" are resolved by a stable and a star. This is the time when we can truly sleep in heavenly peace, because we know that God has entered our world to reclaim it forever.

May the Miracle of the Baby of Bethlehem, fill us with Hope, Peace, Joy and Love this Christmas.

Dear friends,

'There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens...' (Ecclesiastes ch 3 v1)

As you read this you will probably have heard that I have stepped down as your Interim Moderator. I realise that six months is a relatively short time to hold such a role, and that beyond Session, Board and related meetings, I have rarely been able to be in attendance.

For these facts and the realisation that I have been unable to do as much to assist the congregations as I had hoped, I give you my apologies. Juggling the needs of four church communities as well as my own home and family life has proved to be beyond my abilities.

As I write it is not yet clear who Presbytery will appoint in my place long term but you have an excellent temporary Interim Moderator in Mark Malcolm, and whoever it is thereafter I know you will be in good hands. Also you still have a great team of volunteers as well as those in paid positions - to name some would be to exclude others - and I would simply ask that you all consider if there are things you can do to benefit the gospel here - by praying especially, and if you can, by taking on a role and sharing the load. Whatever the future holds, I trust that you continue to walk ever closer with Jesus, that sharing the gospel of good news for all the people of the parish of Mure Memorial remains your guiding motivation, and that you are blessed and faithful in all that you do.

I can assure you that you will remain in my prayers and on our Prayer Diary at Gartcosh & Glenboig particularly for this next while, and ask for your prayers for us too.






