Dear Friends,

Wow!! This is turning out to be a pretty busy summer. Already a host of baptisms, and now several weddings, as well as no doubt the usual clutch of funerals, will make sure the diary is fairly full. Theses rites of passage are important times in the lives of individuals and families and I for one am delighted that at the highest moments of joy as in the birth of a child, or getting married, as well as at the acute moment of pain and loss as in a bereavement, people are still calling on the church to remind them of the presence of God, sharing that experience. There are of course now plenty of alternatives with civil celebrants and humanist who will perform special ceremonies for those who request it, but thankfully a goodly number still turn to God.

For me this is a major privilege of the parish ministry that, for many, the minister still has a right of entry at such highs and lows of family and individual experiences. To be invited to share and indeed lead people in recognizing God's presence at such times is the height of a minister's calling. As the General Assembly of the Church launches a "Decade of Ministry", seeking to call people into the vocation, I hope they have this privilege at the forefront of their campaign.

It is good that there are both ups and downs in such experiences of life. If it were only funerals that I was taking it would be a sad time, all of the time, but fortunately the babies and young children for baptism, and the young (and not so young!) who come to get married, mean that you have all ages involved as part of your ministry and it certainly helps the future and forward momentum of the church to know that there are many young people still seeking the presence of God for their special events.

The future of the church is also the driving force behind two major events this summer. Firstly we will see Douglas Robertson our new Children and Families Worker joining us. Both congregations have committed to help fund his full-time post and he is due to start with us on the 8th of June. Look out for him and give him a big welcome to our congregations and community. Also during the summer, based at Mure Memorial, the Scripture Union is holding a Holiday Club for children and families, led by their National Missions Organiser, Phil Wray. The club will be running from the 3^{rd} August to the 9th August and primary school children will be welcome in the mornings, and young people and families to evening events throughout the week. (If you want to help to lead please get in touch). Hopefully you can see ways in which the congregations are being used to reconnect younger generations with the God of our Lord Jesus Christ. While there is much more to be done, I hope, trust and pray that we will see the fruits of such ministry in our congregations and community and if you can play a part in welcoming these young people into our community so much the better. Have a great summer.

Presbytery Report

The May meeting of Presbytery was a short one.

The Business Committee reported on two appeals against the Presbytery Plan which had been heard by the Commission of Assembly. The first related to the closure of the building of St Columba's Gaelic Church. The Committee found against the Presbytery Plan and instructed Presbytery and the Kirk Session of St Columba's to enter into negotiations to draw up a mission plan for the congregation which will address the future of the buildings. If the plan includes the continued use of the current buildings, fully costed and fully funded proposals for the repair and ongoing maintenance of the building should be set out. If funding cannot be found, then Presbytery will have to bring forward, by December 2016, a new section of the Presbytery Plan with appropriate proposals for readjustment of the charge.

The second appeal from Shettleston Old was against their building being classified

as Category 3, which means that it will be sold during the lifetime of the plan which covers ten years. In this case, the Committee dismissed the appeal and confirmed the building as Category 3 but commended the congregation for their work and witness.

The largest part of the meeting was taken up by a report from the Superintendence Committee which had undertaken a review of the process which had been followed when an issue had been raised by the independent examiner concerning the congregational accounts of a congregation within Glasgow Presbytery. An initial finding by the Committee had concluded that a disciplinary offence may have been committed and a Special Committee was formed to investigate. One of the issues raised was that it then took eighteen months until the judgement of the Presbyterial Commission was published and this had created a real difficulty for the congregation and the small number of office bearers who were aware of the details of the circumstances leading to the case. A further complication was the decision of the Special Committee set up to investigate the matter to instruct that the minster involved be placed on administrative suspension, which inevitably resulted in speculative rumours circulating.

The Superintendence Committee reminded Presbytery that once the proceedings are in the hands of the Special Committee, Presbytery has no locus or influence in how the case unfolds.

Having reviewed the events, the Superintendence Committee brought their comments. They concluded that the time taken by the process is not in any significant sense the responsibility of Presbytery and that they intend to consult with the General Assembly's Legal Ouestions Committee to discuss matters that have arisen from this case, if Presbytery agrees. Currently the congregation in question is close to being free to call a new minister, the monies due to be repaid are subject to an agreement through the Ministries Council and there continues to be good pastoral care through the Interim Moderator.

Among the recommendations made were the following –

- That all congregational trustees be reminded of the need to abide at all times by decisions of the General Assembly, and to be at all times up to date with these, particularly as they relate to remuneration of ministers and other trustees.
- That independent examiners be commended for their painstaking work in determining the accuracy and appropriateness of congregational accounts.
- That every opportunity be taken to provide training and support to congregational treasurers.
- That office bearers of every congregation be encouraged to ask questions of Presbytery should they have any doubt over financial practice in the life of their congregation.

Dear Supporting Churches

We often thank God for your compassion and cheerful giving to support poor and disadvantaged people in Ethiopia. May God bless you as you have blessed others!

In recent months the Church and Community Mobilisation for Development programme (CCMD) has been expanded to new areas and has had encouraging results.

The programme aims to help church leaders and congregations to look beyond their church walls and use the resources they have to positively impact the lives of the poorest in the surrounding communities. It starts with workshops for church leaders and full-time staff. They then run workshops for their congregations.. One possible outcome of these workshops is that local churches decide to start Self-Help Groups in their communities amongst the poorest of the poor. Workshops are also held for local government officials so that they understand what is happening when they see this kind of activity taking place in their area and can be supportive.

As part of the workshops the participants conduct a survey of their local areas. It is not uncommon to find that there are 250 families living in poverty in the communities around each urban church. We find that after several years of involvement in Self Help Groups, 60% of those who participate would say that they have become self-reliant, able to be independent and are no longer in poverty.

Please pray for all of the churches that are doing church and community mobilisation workshops. We thank you for your amazing support and for your prayers.


It's not too late !!! We are trying to organise a gardening team to undertake some light

Lodging House Mission Quarterly Prayer Letter May 2015

Dear Friends,

In Matthew's Gospel, (7:7 - 8) Jesus spoke these words to his disciples and also to those following him:

"Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; he who seeks finds; and to him who knocks, the door will be opened."

What we have here is a strong exhortation to constant determined prayer. All three metaphors are in the present tense which again suggests continuous, persistent prayer. It is such prayer that finds an answer.

The reason for such confidence is explained by the consideration of fatherhood. Jesus compares 'earthly fathers' with his 'Heavenly Father' and by what he says, we notice that they are similar in some ways but different in others. Jesus tells us that a human father will not meet his son's request for food (bread and fish being the commonest food found around the Lake of Galilee) with useless or harmful substitutes even though human fathers are evil; (sinful is implied here).

The Heavenly Father is different. He is full of goodness and love. There is no suggestion of

any reluctance on his part to provide the very best for his children, which might have been derived from the call to persistence in verses 7 - 8. The disciples and all of us are encouraged to come to the Father in full confidence of his willingness to respond.

Please pray in confidence to a heavenly Father who is ready and willing to pour out good gifts upon his children here at the Lodging House Mission.


