#### Dear Friends,

At this time of year, every year, I get a visit from a bunch of friends. I never know when they are coming, but they faithfully appear every year. I do very little to encourage their appearance, or their friendship, but still they come. Their coming is an uplifting experience as they fill me with joy and hope for the future, and although their stay is short, they always leave behind, as they do when they are here, a sense that things can only get better, that dark days will become lighter, and that the shivers of winter will become days of weather suitable for bowling, golfing, walking and even holidays not too far away.

I am of course not talking of human friends, but of a little bunch of snowdrops that appear every Spring below the noticeboard at the Church. As I pass them regularly I am cheered by their presence knowing what their arrival means, as with any Spring flower – Winter is passing, Summer is coming, although Spring itself has a beauty all of its own.

There is no doubt that the Christian Church were on a winner picking the Spring to celebrate the rising of Jesus from the dead. It's as if the whole creation joins in the celebrations, and gifts to us a joyful and beautiful reminder of what and why we are celebrating – the gift of new life. Creation has always intrigued me in the way it offers pictures of what the Christian faith might mean. I am intrigued for example by the snake which can simply slip out of an old skin, leave it behind, and go and enjoy its new appearance. The crawling caterpillar which can hardly move at any pace or reach any

height emerges from its chrysalis to fly with intricately painted wings across the countryside.

I wonder as we approach Easter if any of these natural snapshots might represent us and ours. The signs of new beginning in births or marriages that bring hope for the future; or the opportunity that might be taken to be a new you, to put behind you the old self that you and possibly others don't like, and become a new person; or even change completely to a new creature altogether, beyond being recognised by your friends or family, finding freedom in your new self - free to be the kind of person you would want to be, in a new job, in a new relationship, or after a bereavement.

The resurrection of Jesus from the dead is not just a reminder of the life everlasting that awaits us beyond death, it is a reminder that life in all its fullness can be a gift for the present - the now, living in the joy and hope of the living Christ, seeking to be what he would want us to be and smashing the barriers, rolling the stone away, that prevents us from living life to the full. Hallelujah, Jesus is Risen, in us and for us, individually and together!!

#### From Douglas

Life is progressing within Mure Memorial. There have been two pieces of significant news with the Youth Fellowship. Firstly, we received a grant from Glasgow Presbytery. This money will be used to cover the cost of our end of session trip, as well as buying some

new sports equipment The second piece of news is that the membership has increased by 20%!



It might only be one person extra coming along, but it demonstrates that the young people who were coming feel confident enough to invite their friends! The Youth Fellowship is showing signs of being the safe place for young people to explore their faith that I envisage it becoming.

Away from the Youth Fellowship, plans are being set in place for our Holiday Club this year. This year the Holiday Club will run from the week beginning Monday 1<sup>st</sup> August.



The theme of the week is Guardians of Ancora and it promises to be an excellent week! If anyone wishes to join the team and help during the week, then please speak to me and we'll find a suitable role for you in the team!

The Scripture Union Groups in both Bannerman and Garrowhill continue to go along well. At Bannerman the group is looking at events in the life of Jesus. They have already looked at Jesus in the wilderness and Jesus calling His disciples. In the coming weeks, we'll look at the events leading up to Easter and the resurrection of Jesus. At Garrowhill the children are gearing up for their weekend away to Lendrick Muir in May. Five out of the six young people are attending the weekend, and it promises to be an excellent weekend for them.

Last month I attended the Learn Conference for churches with few or no children. This conference was fully booked, at over 100 places, so this gives an idea of how many churches are struggling. Sadly, the conference confirmed what we all know, that there is no magic wand to magic children and young people into the church. What it will take is a lot of perspiration, prayer and perseverance. I have some ideas of how to take things forward, but at the time of writing this article, I am still mulling over the appropriate strategy to take.

#### **Church Finances**



The Annual Stated Meeting of our church will take place on 13<sup>th</sup> March following the morning service. The Audited Accounts for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2015 will be available before the date of the meeting.

# This year the accounts will show a deficit of almost £7000.

As explained in the December edition of The Link our annual expenditure is approximately £100 000. Our main source of income is of course our offerings along with the tax recovered under the Gift Aid Scheme. Other factors such as donations from our organisations, use of premises and any fundraising activities contribute towards our total income. These allow us to meet our obligations.



There is a large part of our expenditure over which we have no control. This includes dues set by the Church of Scotland for Ministry & Mission and for Presbytery, salaries and of course the same types of obligations that we have within our own household, e.g. Council

Tax, Heating and Lighting, Insurance, Building Maintenance, etc.

We would remind you once again of the benefit of the Gift Aid Scheme whereby you can enhance your giving by simply completing a one-off form which allows the Treasurer to claim back tax at NO COST to yourself. Some of you may already be in the habit of doing this when donating to charity. Gift Aid can be applied whether offerings are made using WFO envelopes or Standing Order. Please speak to any member of the Finance Committee if you would like to complete a Gift Aid form.

Recent years have shown a gradual but noticeable reduction in our offerings. Thanks to all the "regular givers" for your offerings during the year. The New Year is a time when many of us "take stock" and review things. At this point we would appeal to those members of congregation who are still not contributing anything financially to Mure Memorial to do this, as it is clear that the majority of the offerings are still coming from the minority of members! In these difficult times, is that fair? Accordingly at this time we would ask that members give careful consideration to reviewing their contribution to the church in order that we might better be able to meet our commitments.

All we ask is that you give what you can afford.



It is heartening to note that we received a bundle of WFO envelopes from a member who had been unable to attend for some time but who had continued to fill envelopes weekly. Even when any one of us is unable to attend, the church is still there and bills still require to be paid.

#### **Presbytery Report**

The February meeting of Presbytery was held in Pollokshields Church. I am getting to know parts of Glasgow I have never visited before, since we had to decant from Govan!

Our guest speakers were from the Churches Mutual Credit Union which is now up and running and ministers, elders, church employees and trustees are all eligible to join. They are offering Regular Saver's Accounts and Car and Personal Loans at competitive rates.

Since its launch in 2015, CMCU has opened 600 accounts, taken in £1.3m in deposits, issued over £750,000 in affordable loans and have now launched a new Corporate Savers account for Church Councils, Kirk Sessions and Presbyteries to invest in. For church members who are not eligible to join the CMCU we were reminded that there are other Credit Unions in operation within Glasgow Presbytery and members may be eligible to

The World Mission Committee reminded us of Fairtrade Fortnight which runs from 29<sup>th</sup> February until 13<sup>th</sup> March and had invited a speaker to address Presbytery. She spoke about the Rainbow Turtle Charity which is based in Paisley. They had chosen their name because rainbows are symbols of hope and promise and also of inclusion and diversity. When turtles are 'belly up' they are at their most vulnerable to attack and it seems that the poorest people in the world will be forever vulnerable unless we turn trade values the right way up.

By buying items which carry the Fair Trade Mark we can make a massive difference to farmers in the third world. It helps to wipe out child labour, aids gender equality and improves the level of education. In Malawi very few children go to high school because their parents have to pay and so children of secondary school age are sent out to work. When we buy Fair Trade products, it is usually the women who benefit by earning a fair wage and they will then use this money to support their families. Our speaker reminded us that people trafficking is second only to drug trafficking, with people being sold for the sex trade and slave labour. There are around 20 million people in slavery throughout the world,

many of them children, and this is driven by poverty and greed.

Our speaker had brought along several products and spoke about the Divine chocolate company which is 45% owned by the cocoa farmers. These bars of chocolate may cost us a little more to buy than our well known brands, but the difference can be life changing to the farmers. Did you know you can even buy Fair Trade footballs? Douglas has actually ordered some for the YF. Another aspect of the work of Rainbow Turtle is to lobby both local and national politicians. She spoke of the need to improve workers rights, reminding us of the Bangladesh factory disaster, but to date only 8 out of 300,000 factories have made any improvements to their buildings. The Mission Committee intimated that there will be an event for those interested in finding out more about Messy Church on 23rd April in Burnside Blairbeth Church. If you are interested in going along, please speak to Douglas.

The Community Responsibility Committee are holding an Ageing Well Training conference on Friday 11<sup>th</sup> March in Glasgow City Chambers. This is a practical training day to help churches better support the spiritual needs of older people.

The Learning and Nurture Committee approved a grant of £150 for Mure Memorial. This was in response to an application which Douglas had made for funding for our Youth Fellowship, so well done Douglas!




