Dear Friends,

I heard a wonderful story recently of the Church's love in action. A long serving elder died, and her two children had long since disowned her and wished no responsibility for her body. The Kirk Session of the congregation applied to the Procurator Fiscal to claim the body, to prevent a pauper's funeral for her. The Fiscal agreed and the Session organised her cremation, after a service in the church, refreshments for the mourners (the congregation turned out in numbers), and just recently a scattering of the ashes in the church's rose garden. It cost the congregation well over £2,000 and they would do it all over again.

I think the story is great because it is the church being a family, and acting like a family - not like the elder's own family, but as a family ought to act at such a time. Romans 12 is a wonderful chapter on how we should relate to one another in Christian community. One particular phrase stands out for me, "Be happy with those who are happy, and weep with those who weep" (v. 15). It is a verse that goes to the heart of Christian relationships. Each of us feels what others are feeling. We share their burdens and we share their joys. I was sharing with Ruth, our ministry enquirer, and the elders in training, the privilege of being a representative of the church in the way in which we share, in the baptism of children, the joys of parenthood; we mourn with those who have lost loved ones; and we feel the anticipation of young couples and their families organising weddings. (I have twelve on the go at the moment!)

However we are more than just a church representative, we are the presence of Christ

(or at least should be!) for people who are going through the highs and lows of life. We ought to be a loving presence, one who is able to set aside selfish thought and interests and fully immerse ourselves in the other's wellbeing, and particularly for those with no family we can be there for them in both joys and sorrows.

I hope and pray that this is the sort of community/family that we can create at Mure, that we might be Christ to one another as we move into the future.





Presbytery Report

The April meeting of Presbytery started with a celebration of Communion.

A tribute was paid to the Reverend Frank Haughton who died on Easter Sunday at the age of 98. Mr Haughton took a service at Mure Memorial several years ago, when Allan Vint was Interim Moderator at Kirkintilloch St Mary's where Mr Haughton served as Minister from 1947 until his retiral in 2000. He continued to preach each year on the anniversary of his retiral and quite recently officiated at the wedding of his grand-daughter.

A welcome was extended to the Rev Alastair Duncan, the new Minister of St George's Tron. Members of Presbytery were asked to make it as widely known as possible that there is now a Sunday evening service at 7.00pm each week and to encourage folk to go along.

As the Presbytery Plan is being worked through, there were several reports from the Mission Strategy Committee. Approval was given to the Basis of Linkage between Shawlands and Shawlands South churches which will be followed by a Union in three years time. As both congregations are vacant at present, permission was given to call a Minister. Springburn Church was given permission to call when their minister retires in the summer, but this will be on the basis of Reviewable tenure in anticipation of a Parish Grouping being formed with St Rollox Church. Stepps Church was given an allocation of 0.5 of a ministry post in the approved Presbytery Plan and this would follow after a period of Interim Ministry. However the application had been turned down by the Interim Ministry Task Group. As a result of the way in which the Ministries Council calculates posts allocated to congregations, Presbytery discovered that they had a 0.5 Ministry post unallocated available within the Presbytery Plan and it was recommended that a temporary allocation of this 0.5 post be made to Steps for five years to allow the

to call a Minister on Reviewable Tenure. Presbytery approved this.

Our own Basis of Linkage was presented to Presbytery to note prior to the congregational votes. Three congregations who are on Reviewable Tenure were granted Full tenure. They were Colston Milton, Giffnock: Orchardhill and Rutherglen: Stonelaw.

The convener of the Finance Committee presented the Presbytery Report and Financial Statement for the year ended 31st December 2012. The Balance Sheet showed total assets less liabilities of £400,500 compared to £478,475 in 2011. All congregations had paid their Presbytery dues last year with the exception of St George's Tron and this had resulted in a bad debt of £9,943. Presbytery has made a commitment to support the new congregation of St George's Tron Church of Scotland to the sum of £60,000 spread over 2013 and 2014.

The Convener of the Community
Responsibility Committee introduced a
speaker from the Transformation Team who
spoke about the implications of the Welfare
Reform Act and the strain which this is putting
on existing services such as Food banks. At
present there are 14 Food banks and 22 Soup
Kitchens across the city, but the need for food
services is expected to increase. Whilst many
users of the services are people with mental
health problems, addictions, asylum seekers,
refugees and people who have lost their jobs,

other users are people who are in work but on low pay.

Linkage with Baillieston St Andrew's

The basis of Linkage document, which has been agreed unanimously by a joint meeting of the two Kirk Sessions, was dealt with, for noting, at the meeting of Presbytery on Tuesday evening.

The next step in the process is for the two congregations to vote to accept the basis of Linkage. Members will be given the opportunity to vote, after the service on **Sunday 19**th **May.**

Voting slips will be provided by Presbytery and a member of our Presbytery Support and Development team will be present to oversee the voting process.

Members of Baillieston St Andrew's will be voting after their service on that same Sunday.

If both congregations vote to accept the document, and the congregation of Baillieston St Andrew's also votes to accept Malcolm as their Minister, then it is anticipated that approval by Presbytery will be sought at its meeting in June.

Jonathan Veira Tour Coming to Mure Memorial Church Glasgow on 22nd June 2013 at 7.30 pm

Recently praised in *The Independent* for his brilliant performance – 'larger than life and utterly credible', and by *The Arts Desk* for being 'a comic (bass) baritone now in his vintage prime', international opera star Jonathan Veira is no stranger to venues that hold thousands of people, but he is changing his habits. Instead of performing Verdi, Britten or Donizetti on the opera scene as he did - to critical acclaim —he is now just as likely to be found singing Billy Joel or Gospel. Jonathan is a musical chameleon, performing songs of great diversity to an incredibly high standard — which possibly makes him unique in the world of entertainment.

Jonathan Veira's one man show is distinctive because you get so much more than just 'the voice'. He is a superb comic raconteur, whose anecdotal story telling has people of all generations rocking with laughter.

When asked why he is putting aside opera for a while and going 'Larger than Life', Jonathan answers,

"For nearly 27 years I have been singing opera all around the world whilst also developing my 'Audience with JV', which actually began 22

years ago. The 'side-show' has gradually taken on a life of its own ... spawning a DVD, seven gospel CDs and a list of venues wanting to host the show. We're excited that this Tour will give airspace to JV simply being JV with an audience.

I'm energised by doing these shows because of the closeness and interaction with the audience. It's wonderful to be able to incorporate the wide variety of music that I love to perform from Verdi and Mozart to Billy Joel, Elton John and even some Country & Western! I love having the freedom to tell the stories of my life and faith in an open, honest – and mostly funny – way! I believe that all this together makes my show unique.

Following a trip to Ethiopia at the start of the year I am also thrilled to be in partnership with Compassion UK – a child-sponsoring charity that does amazing work with children all around the world." It is rare these days to find someone who can sing beautifully, entertain *and* make people of all ages laugh, and possibly even cry. Jonathan paints a true, and sometimes painful, picture of life in word and song. To communicate in a family friendly way, without using bad language as JV does is remarkable - it's a reputation to be proud of.

Jonathan Veira really is 'larger than life' and you'll love to see him in action.
