Dear Friends

"Get a life" is an originally American idiom and catchphrase, usually intended as a taunt, to indicate that the person being so addressed is devoting an inordinate amount of time to trivial or hopeless matters and implies the addressee needs to go out and make their way in the world. It may also be directed at someone who is perceived as boring or single-minded; suggesting they acquire some other interests. Sometimes the phrase is used to describe people who are viewed as officious or meddling in the affairs of others. It is another way of saying "get your own life"!

You may well have heard some young person using the phrase over the past couple of decades, or may well have used it yourself. I have always found any urging to live life to the full a positive one, especially within the Christian faith, and especially after Easter. Was it not Jesus who said, "I have come that you may have life, life in all its fullness (John 10)? Particularly after the celebration of the Resurrection and leading up to the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, there can be little doubt about the "life" that filled the early disciples.

Sadly the Church today has gained a reputation for being dull and boring, concerning itself with matters trivial to most people's lives, or enjoying meddling and messing about with the capacity for young people and others to know love and joy in their lives. To the Church the young people of the last couple of decades could well be saying, "Get a Life!!" – and we should, not just any life, but the life of the

resurrected Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit. We should get rid of the fear and anxiety that so overshadows our capacity for joy. We should rid ourselves of the shame that so causes us to hide in the background. We should set aside the concerns of what others may think, or the fear of failure and go and be what God wants us to be. It is no coincidence that Easter is set in Springtime, the season of new beginnings and fresh starts, and so it should be, experiencing the forgiveness and grace on the cross, and the power of the resurrection.

What "getting a life" will mean will be different for each individual, but capacity is there in everyone. Hear these words from Nelson Mandela.

"Our deepest fear is not that we are inadequate. Our deepest fear is that we are powerful beyond measure. It is our light, not our darkness that most frightens us. We ask ourselves, who am I to be brilliant, talented and fabulous? Actually, who are you not to be? You are a child of God. Your playing small doesn't serve the world."

Go, serve Christ in the world, and live the life that is in you!!

Presbytery Report

After our opening devotions, the Moderator officially welcomed several people to Presbytery. These are folks who have taken up

new appointments, although they may not be new to Presbytery. Amongst them was Alex Stuart, although Alex has been a well known face for several years. Our invited speaker was John Kewley from Church House, Bridgeton, which is one of the projects run under the auspices of Glasgow Presbytery. It works with children from one of the most deprived areas in Scotland trying to build positive relationships and encourage the young people to grow and develop, at their own pace, by helping them to recognise their own abilities, gifts and talents and ultimately help them to be more able to make choices and decisions affecting their future. Their core activities take place at their club nights throughout the week, but they also organise day trips and holidays. Church House was originally set up by the Rev Arthur Gray in 1942 and he took its motto from Nehemiah 3:18 "Rise up and build". To-day it is run as an integrated children and family support centre. Unfortunately, John is leaving and they are at present looking for a new project manager.

The Business Committee brought recommendations about changes to the committee structures of Presbytery, which generated a very protracted discussion. The Finance Committee then presented their annual report of the Presbytery Accounts. The balance sheet showed an increase in total assets less liabilities from £400,500 in 2012 to £502,054. The key factors were a gain in the market value of

investments amounting to £39,798. £60,000 of funding has been received to meet the commitment to the future of St George's Tron Church of Scotland. There had also been a saving in staffing costs.

The Community Responsibility Committee had invited Lindsay Sanderson the Convener of the ACTS Working Party to address Presbytery in connection with Humans Trafficking in relation to the Commonwealth Games.

She described Human Trafficking as modern day slavery which was the second fastest growing crime in the world. People should not be treated as a commodity to be bought and sold. She described it as a hidden crime where people were smuggled into communities very often working in the building industry, in hospitality, fishing and the beauty industry as well as organised begging rings. There was also the issue of forced marriage. She then asked the question, "What can churches do?" She suggested that we should be active politically, seeking information and raising awareness.

Although the police have no intelligence of an increase in trafficking during the Commonwealth Games, they are aware that it may well happen. UN boxes are being placed around the city to raise awareness using presentations and they are looking for volunteers to run this scheme.
