Sometimes it's good to remember how far we have travelled, even in our own lifetime. Goodness knows what the present generation of young people will be reminiscing about with their own children and grandchildren. It certainly won't be outside "cludgies" and "wally" pots.

We are in the midst of a sea of change both in our own city, country and world. By the time you have read this, the results of the local elections to the City Council will be known. Whoever is leading the council, the country, or the world, whoever is minister at Mure Memorial, Christ is Lord of all, and in due time all will pass into the memories of older people and the history books for the young. I finish with some lines from a popular hymn:

Crowns and thrones may perish, Kingdoms rise and wane, But the Church of Jesus, Constant will remain.

I wish you all a future free from living with anger, fear and nostalgia, and an appreciation of the fullness of life in Christ who has been raised from the dead and waits for us to enter His future with Him.

Liz is part of the Connected Church team and looks after Tearfund projects in Ethiopia, Kenya and Malawi. She recently visited the Project which we support in Kale Hewett Church.

On the first day of my visit, we visited a Self Help Group in a rural area south of Hawassa. The group's name was Hursheke, which means, 'we're ambitious to grow fast'. This group of 20 welcoming, lovely ladies had started on 20th May 2012 (an exact date they were keen we note) and they were saving 5 Birr (17p) a week. The total savings now held by the group are 20,000 Birr (£722).

Meseret, one of the group members, talked about how she had been the poorest of the poor and how she had been suffering from poverty. She said they had been so abused by money lenders and they were so pleased to be free from them now. Others spoke about the generating activities they individually (selling coffee, raising hens for eggs, growing false banana) and what they did as a group (cattle fattening, buying things wholesale and then selling in the village). They spoke of freedom from money lenders, new skills acquired, independence in their household expenditure and hope. What was apparent too was that they supported each other and looked out for each other. As Hermanu, a project manager in Hawassa, told me, the essence of the Self Help Groups (SHGs) is love, tolerance and respect.

There were two big discoveries for me as I spent time with people the SHGs and Tearfund Ethiopia. Firstly the importance of Facilitators, who persevere through challenges and discouragement because they know the transformation and growth that SHGs bring about. Facilitators have a tough job - there are many discouragements and sometimes hostility when they bring the idea of SHGs to

new communities. They made it clear that they persevere because they are investing in people.

One said it was seeing the growth in marginalised women which kept her going. Another said she sees that SHGs change attitudes and behaviour and the challenges are small compared to what is gained from their work.

Secondly, SHGs are a social movement. It's not just about the SHGs but the structures that are established to support them and help them to flourish and have an impact wider than themselves. Kale Hewett Church mobilises its local churches to introduce SHGs and supports them as they do. The local churches appoint facilitators and SHGs are established. When a number of groups are established in an area, they then form a group above them, called a Cluster Level Association (CLA). This is made up of SHG members within that area and is funded by subs from each member SHG. Together they tackle things a single SHG could not do. One CLA in Adama told us that they had explained the community's literacy needs to the government. As a result, the government gave them two classrooms to use for literacy education in the evening and trained 15 volunteers from the CLA to run the literacy classes.

The next step is for members of CLAs in an area to establish a Federal Level Association. Again this group takes on broader issues that SHGs and CLAs cannot tackle alone. In Adama, where there have been SHGs since 2002, the FLA has secured permission and a site from the government to build a training and resource centre for use by the local community, providing facilities like a library and technical training.

Tearfund's role in all of this is to support, build capacity, provide financial resources and to monitor and evaluate the work done. We're walking alongside the church as it rolls out SHGs in new communities. We're also working with church on an effective exit strategy for well established SHGs, which will lead to FLAs being self-funded and independent, freeing up resources for new SHGs to be established.

I am writing to you, to give you my thanks for the continued support that Mure Memorial Church has shown to 'Glasgow Cathedral Not Quite New Shop'. Your donations have always been gratefully received. You are probably aware, however, that we recently took the decision to close the shop. It was a very hard one to make and was done with the greatest of sadness. The fates were against us, I'm afraid. We were facing increased loss, lower profits and not enough staff to keep going. We shall all miss the shop and the outreach it provided. It's thanks to Mure's generosity (and others) that we were able to continue for the length of time that we did. Again I give you my thanks.
