Dear Friends,

Some of you will be aware that occasionally on a Sunday morning I am prone to bursting out in song during my sermon, usually when I am reminded of some words of a hymn or song that matches with what I am saying. This week in the midst of another couple of funerals, pastoral visits and church meetings, I felt again that I wanted to burst out in song. It wasn't this time a particular song that came to mind, just a joyful hymn of praise for the unsung heroes of our community and church. You know the kind of person to whom I'm referring, indeed you may well be one. The people I am thinking about, and indeed, about whom I am praising God, are the countless people who work away behind the scenes in so many contexts of need and care – family members who stretch themselves to the limit caring for loved ones; church workers volunteering in all manner of situations to work with the children, the elderly, the administration, or around the building; people who serve our community or local charities, often with routine but important tasks. All doing so quietly in the background wishing for no other attention than the good of those they seek to serve.

It is awesome, and utterly important, how the basic fabric of society and humanity is dependent on such people. That the government, with its notion of "Big Society", or even the church with its references now to "social capital", (a suggestion that while the church can't add much to the economy in pure financial terms, it ought to be supported and funded by charities and government because of the caring people it provides), should try to make some claim for making this happen, is of course a great arrogance, when for the most part it is simply who we are, and what we do as human beings.

However that such people who don't look for rewards or even our thanks, (although it is good to give it even if unwanted), allow us to give thanks and praise to God for them - this is also a part of who we are and what some of us are moved to do – and we do it. If you see someone doing such work, giving of time and energy without the want of pay or praise, give thanks to God for them; if you have the

opportunity then thank them for their commitment and care; and better still if you are able, why don't you join them and move others to praise the God of our faith for your contribution to human wellbeing and community.

Presbytery Report

At the October meeting we heard the Annual Report from the Lodging House Mission. They had seen an increase of 10% usage since last year with around 130 visitors coming over their doorstep every day. They continue to maintain a high level of care, having served 45,000 meals in the past 12 months. No-one is ever turned away. They now offer fourteen various learning and development opportunities every week alongside prayer, Bible study and services taken by their chaplain. Unfortunately, they are looking at a substantial deficit this year. Last year's deficit was cleared because of two very generous legacies.

The Strategy Advisory Group brought some proposed amendments as to how they would calculate the average giving per member for each congregation. This is part of Factor 3 – Congregational Size & Strength and is to be calculated using the total offering figure extracted from the 2009 Congregational Accounts for each congregation. This will be divided by the number of those present at worship on the 30th October 2011 and 6th November 2011, but they have now decided to exclude those under 16 from the calculation, although they will be included in the head count. The committee also gave further details of the timescale. They will have the first draft of the plan ready for the end of January. This will be followed by a time for consultation during February and March, with the second draft being ready for

April. They are still hoping to have the new Presbytery Plan in place by June 2012. The Property Committee asked all members of Presbytery to note that The Church of Scotland Insurance Company has introduced as a mandatory requirement the obligation on congregations to have all portable electrical appliances tested annually by a competent person who does not have to be an electrician. One Minister pointed out that it costs between £1.50 and £2.00 per appliance and he had counted 90 appliances in his church. How many might we have? He said that there was a training course available to become a competent person and be allowed to carry out PAT testing. The cost of the course was £350 to £400, but that grants were available.

If you are interested in finding out more, Andy Stewart would love to hear from you!! The Church and Society Roadshow is coming to Glasgow and will take place between 10.00am and 2.00 pm on Saturday 5th November at the Pearce Institute, Govan. There will be stalls, leaflets, a cafe, Olive Tree Holy Land crafts for sale and a chance to meet with members of the Church and Society Council.

The Ministry and Stewardship committee reminded the meeting of the forthcoming Stewardship Conference and encouraged all congregations to send representatives to learn about the programme. The General Assembly has instructed that all congregations must run a stewardship campaign every three years. The committee also presented the Ministry & Mission Contribution figures for 2012. The General Assembly had approved a 3% increase in the total income.

Our proposed figure from "121" is £52,700, but the Committee has used its allowance to reduce it slightly to £51,333.

The World Mission Committee encouraged congregations to organise a "Souper Sunday 2012" event.

Under the Vacancy Business, we dealt with the Call to the Revd Bill Hunter of Ruchazie to Howe of Fife Church in the Presbytery of St Andrews. Bill, you will recall, was our Interim –Moderator at the start of our vacancy.
