Dear Friends

Lance Armstrong, once the epitome of the world class athlete, a seven times winner of arguably the most challenging of all sporting agendas, the three-week long cycling Tour De France, has been reported by former team mates to be a serial cheat, drug user and drug peddler. Silvio Berlusconi, media mogul, football club owner and Prime Minister of Italy on three separate occasions, has been found guilty of fraud and given a prison sentence. There are of course some who say, "About time!" There were enough rumours and even knowledge around for any of them to be dealt with at a much earlier time, and possibly seriously cutting down on the damage they were able to do to victims, the wider community, and the communities in which they plied their trade. Unfortunately, with success, power and wealth comes not only responsibilities, but clearly also temptations, - temptations to abuse the status which society has given to you, often apparently well-earned.

However also with the status comes an entourage, a group of followers who are either in awe, or bought by the same means success, power and wealth. This following will either develop an acute blindness to the failings of their leader, or their silence can be bought in myriad ways, so that the harmful foibles of the leadership are kept out of the public domain.

The answer to all this, which will of course continue as it has done down through the ages, is for people of integrity, knowing the risk of personal sacrifice, even of life, if not of career, to be a WHISTLEBLOWER. The one or more who are able to say, "This is unacceptable. This has to stop. I am the one who has to do it." All of us at different levels of society are constantly challenged by the behaviour of others. Mostly we will happily look the other way, "It's just them, what else do you expect." In the Christian Church and in society as a whole, some people, informed by the example of Christ, need to sensitively, and/ or publicly bring to light the behaviours that so often caused damage and pain to others. People need to be challenged if they are harming others, or even themselves. Only then can real transformation and real leadership be seen in the church and in the public domain, so that our future leaders and heroes might remain so, in life and in death. Otherwise our future generations will never see past their X-box or Games Station heroes, because the reality of those in the real world is too difficult to bear. Yours in Christ. Malcolm




More favourite recipes

Presbytery Report

The October meeting of Presbytery must be amongst the longest on record, ending at 11.10 pm.

The main item on the agenda was the report of the special committee set up to consider the future of St George's Tron Church of Scotland.

Towards the end of 2011, Presbytery had begun to deal officially with a request from the minister and elders of the congregation to leave the denomination. They had made it clear that it was their hope to acquire the building where they presently worship for their ongoing use as an independent congregation.

Article III of the Constitution of the Church of Scotland demands that the Church provides the "ordinances of religion" to the whole people of Scotland through a territorial ministry. Presbytery would, therefore, have to decide whether the building of St George's Tron was essential to fulfil the plan for mission of the Church of Scotland in the centre of Glasgow and, at its May meeting, Presbytery approved the appointment of a Special Committee under the leadership of The Very Rev David Lunan to investigate the possibility of maintaining a city centre ministry in the building of St George's Tron, should the majority of the present congregation decide to leave the Church of Scotland.

The Committee was to report to the October meeting, but on 12th June, Presbytery received a letter from the Minister and Session Clerk of St George's Tron Church of Scotland announcing that the congregation no longer considered themselves to be part of the Presbytery of Glasgow or of the denomination of the Church of Scotland. This declaration was taken at the June Presbytery meeting to mean that the Minister had demitted his Charge and his status as a minister of the Church of Scotland, and that the elders had resigned as elders and trustees of the Church of Scotland congregation of St George's Tron.

The Committee's report came under three headings.

Firstly, the current status of St George's Tron Church of Scotland: It concluded that the congregation continues to exist, even if, at present, it is the name of a handful of members, its assessor elders and its Interim Moderator appointed by Presbytery, and that it is essential and integral to the life of the Church of Scotland in Glasgow. There should be no confusion of identity with the independent congregation which, for the time being, is still worshipping in the Buchanan Street building. Secondly, the future vision for the

rebuilding of St George's Tron, Church of Scotland congregation: The location of the building lends itself to being a hub for the ministry and mission to a range of sectors in society such as students, asylum seekers,

the homeless, shoppers and shop workers. The report quoted the Rev Tom Allan as saying, "The Church is the hand of God reaching out to the world", and under his ministry St George's Tron was established as the "Church at the heart of the city with the city at its heart". The Committee believes that a vibrant congregation can rise again, however, this will not happen in the short or even medium term. The Committee, therefore, recommended that at the start of the process a Transitional Ministry be set up for a contractual period of time, possibly three to five years, with the possibility of the minister being inducted to the charge at the end of the period of transition, should the parties agree.

Thirdly, the consequences as a result of the actions of those who have now left the Church of Scotland: The title to the St George's Tron church building is held by the Church of Scotland General Trustees and in the event that the building was deemed to be unnecessary for use by the Church of Scotland, it would be incumbent on the General Trustees to seek the optimum value from the sale or lease of the property. The Manse is subject to trust conditions which were imposed when a previous manse was donated to the congregation. These conditions require that the house be used solely as a manse for the parish minister of the Church of Scotland congregation. The General Trustees have indicated that they could not see themselves entering into a legal agreement with the independent

congregation which at present is continuing to occupy the building. This congregation has broken faith with the Trustees by defaulting on its past payments to the Church of Scotland and is not considered a reliable signatory to an occupancy agreement. In the course of its work, the Committee became concerned by some accounts of how the congregation had been organising its internal affairs over the last few years and there were reports that members who tried to raise questions were simply encouraged to leave.

The committee was therefore recommending that immediate steps should be taken to recover possession of all the properties and assets belonging to the Church of Scotland.

After the presentation of the Report there was lengthy discussion and many questions were raised, The Solicitor of the Church of Scotland was present at the meeting and was able to confirm the present financial situation. Those who have left the Church of Scotland have left behind unpaid contributions to central funds and to the Presbytery of Glasgow, together with an outstanding loan to the General Trustees, amounting to almost £1M.

The meeting finally agreed to accept the report and the various deliverances which it contained.

FUTURE OF MURE MEMORIAL CHURCH

Update on the Presbytery Plan.

As you will know, for the past two years the Presbytery of Glasgow has had to come up with a plan for its territory which would lead to the reduction of ministers by thirty across Glasgow. A plan published earlier this year had distributed this loss on a percentage system across the Presbytery with Mure Memorial being awarded 0.67% of a fulltime post, but if we joined with St. Andrew's: Baillieston, that could lead to a fulltime and a half-time post between the two churches. Fortunately the Presbytery saw the nonsense of percentage posts and the plan was dropped.

However, the Presbytery still had to shed 30 posts and a new team was formed, basing their decisions largely on the previous work. So in the new plan published last month, Mure Memorial was to link with St. Andrew's leading to a full union, with a staffing complement of 1 fulltime minister and one half-time Presbytery Parish worker. Both congregations took up the right to appeal the decision. Both congregations thought the move to a full union between the two was undesirable and unworkable. However whereas Mure Memorial leadership were wanting to look to retain a fulltime minister at our church, St. Andrew's had accepted the loss of ministry and agreed, reluctantly, to a linkage.

Leaders from both congregations met with Presbytery Plan representatives and everyone agreed to drop any reference to full union, and a number of options were considered. The following is what is now on offer.

Option 1: Immediate Linkage, based on Rev. Malcolm Cuthbertson being minister of the two congregations, aided by an Associate Minister. This Associate would be definitely guaranteed as a half-time post, but could be increased to fulltime if the two congregations could meet the shortfall in a fulltime salary. This would require Mure Memorial to find an additional £10,000 per annum, above the £55,000 we presently pav to Edinburgh. St. Andrew's would have the same issue, except that because an Associate Minister is not provided with a manse, St. Andrew's could find that income from the let of their manse. The respective duties of the two ministers would have to be decided by the leaders of both congregations, but Malcolm would be the line manager of the Associate.

For this to happen, the Presbytery would have to have agreement from Malcolm that he is willing to be the minister of the two congregations, and the joint parish. Mure Memorial congregation would need to agree to the linkage, and St. Andrew's would have to both agree to the linkage and to Malcolm becoming their minister. The Presbytery, before the approval of a fulltime Associate, would need to ensure the finances are in place for the additional half salary. All of this could be in place by March 2013. Option 2: Deferred Linkage. Malcolm has three years left on his Tenure (contract) at Mure Memorial and could simply wait out those three years. In the meantime Presbytery would move to appoint a minister at St. Andrew's and, when Malcolm's contract is up, will make the new minister at St. Andrew's the minister of the linked congregations. As it stands presently, Mure Memorial would have little or no say concerning the appointment. However, since Malcolm had come to Mure Memorial with the intention of retiring from the position and since St. Andrew's has largely been suffering from a couple of difficult ministries over the past eight years, Presbytery Plan leaders were asked to defer the Linkage till the end of Malcolm's ministry, allowing him to continue in place at Mure Memorial while giving a minister to St. Andrew's for a period of up to eight years in the hope of rebuilding the congregation.

While the Presbytery representatives did not rule this out they did note that it would be difficult to put into place. Firstly on grounds of finance, since the National Church would be asked to meet an additional half salary at St. Andrew's for a period of eight years. While Mure Memorial could help out with a commitment of £10,000 per year, St. Andrew's would have difficulty in raising a similar amount, since under this tenure, their minister would have to live in the manse, thus depriving the congregation from any income from letting the house. It would also be unusual (though not impossible) for a minister coming to the end of his contract to be given a further five year contract, when it is not in line with the Plan. Finally, although not mentioned at the time, European legislation would allow a retiring minister to continue beyond 65, and

thus the commitment from the National Church could be challenged to be extended and it is unlikely the Church would agree to this when an extension is a legal possibility. However it is still on the table for discussion.

Mure Memorial will discuss the issue at its Session meeting on the 14th November, by that time they will also have had feedback from the discussions at St. Andrew's Session, and the Presbytery would like a response prior to a special meeting of Presbytery on the 4th December, which would seek to approve a Plan for the whole of Glasgow.


