Mure Memorial Church is the known name of Glasgow : Mure Memorial, Church of Scotland,

Dear Friends.

I always find this time of year strange. There seems to be an unsettled atmosphere that continually shifts the ground on which we have our being. On the one hand this is the season of remembrance highlighted in our Remembrance Day service. However the season is well chosen since Autumn is that time when we also reminisce about the warm summer holidays, the longer, brighter, and warmer days which we won't see for a while. It is also with the onset of Winter, the time when many frail people will sadly breathe their last, and there is the opportunity to look back with family over the contribution and legacy of many lives again now gone.

The strangeness however, before things become too morbid, is that, alongside this, in our worship and church life generally, we are celebrating the dedication of our organisations and the start of our new session of activities, and the empty halls of the summer are no more. This pendulum swing of looking backwards and forwards, although a constant part of the life of any congregation, seems somewhat pronounced at this time of year. This forward momentum was helped by having a recent meeting of leaders from the congregation. They were asked to choose priorities for the way ahead that might focus the work of the church for the foreseeable future. The meeting decided on the three issues of (1) our children and young people, (2) the development of worship and (3) the continuing improvement in our pastoral care. The Kirk Session will be looking at ways in which this agenda can be taken forward in the near future, but already things are moving. We will have the appointment of a worker as part

of the ministry team to work with children and young people during the winter. On the worship front we are still looking for a time and space for alternative worship, while having another look at the number of our members unable to attend for 10 am on a Sunday. We have an excellent care team at present, but we are still unable to meet the demand of hospital visits, and visiting those who are largely housebound, and getting elderly up to the building for worship and other events. These issues will no doubt take up a fair amount of discussion and activity over the winter and beyond.

I hope we can get through this season with good celebrations of the past, but with the desire to use them as a launching pad for the future, a better future freed from the destruction of hatred and greed, from squabbles over power, so prevalent in the wider world, and instead a real desire for unity and love, so much needed today. "Thy Kingdom come, O Lord."

Presbytery Report

Our guest speaker at the October meeting of Presbytery was Mrs Heather French who has served for many years as the National Vocations Promotion Officer for the Ministries Council. She disclosed some concerning figures to us. Unless there are more entrants into training for full time ministry, by 2020 the Church of Scotland will be around 200 ministers short. By 2024, Glasgow Presbytery will have lost 43 of its ministers due to retirement.

She shared with us some of the ways that the Ministries Council are looking to reverse this trend and encourage more people to consider training for ministry. They are posing the question, "What's God's grand plan for your life?" and she stressed the importance of our prayers for the work which she does.

She assured us that there was no intention of lowering the standards of the candidates being accepted.

They have been looking at sister churches who seem to have had some degree of success using definitive marketing strategies. There has been greater press coverage, advertising and a greater presence at events.

They are trying to raise awareness locally and are looking for local vocation champions. These could be ministers, deacons, elders or members of congregations who would help to organise vocation conferences locally.

They are also engaging with young people in a pilot project, which is being run in Arbroath St Andrew's Church, where a group of around six young people are sharing accommodation and working as a team within the Parish. Apprenticeships and summer placement are also being offered.

The Business Committee reported that word had been received from the Ministries Council in Edinburgh, that the Presbytery Planning Task Group had accepted the Glasgow Presbytery Plan.

A new Strategy Officer has been appointed and will take up her appointment at the end of October. A request had been made for more youth representation at Presbytery and Committee were recommending that two young people in the age group 18-25 be invited to be Youth Representatives to Presbytery with the same rights and privileges as Youth Representatives at the General Assembly. This means they will be entitled to speak and move motions but not vote during debates on Committee reports and Overtures, but not entitled to speak during debates on matters affecting Presbytery procedures or Standing Orders. The arrangement will be reviewed after one year. This was agreed.

The Stewardship and Finance Committee reported that Glasgow Presbytery has been assigned a figure of £6,220,590 for its 2015 Ministries and Mission Contributions. This represents an increase of 0.35% from last year. The proposed figure for Mure Memorial is £59, 890.

The Committee also gave us a helpful reminder of the duties of Trustees.

The Community Responsibility Committee made another appeal for support for foodbanks, especially in the run up to Christmas.

They are also researching to what extent congregations are involved in the role of Credit Unions in communities around the Presbytery.

The World Mission Committee had already been authorised by Presbytery to explore the possibility of Twinning with a partner in Pakistan at Presbytery level. The World Mission Council in Edinburgh had received a request from the Church of Pakistan Diocese in Hyderabad to twin with a Church of Scotland Presbytery and, having looked at their profile, the World Mission Council staff were suggesting that this was a good match.

A request was now being made for approval that a profile of Glasgow Presbytery be sent to the Diocese of Hyderabad in Pakistan along with an offer to further explore the potential for Twinning. This was approved and it was also agreed that the Business Committee would set up a working group to take the proposal forward and report back to Presbytery.
