Mure Memorial Church is the known name of Glasgow : Mure Memorial, Church of Scotland,

Friends,

While preparing a recent sermon on Joseph in Egypt I was caught by the word 'steward'. This used to be a central word in the English vocabulary - shop-steward, bar-steward, airsteward, but appears to be fast disappearing. The word, or rather the role, is a very important one throughout the Bible as countless people act the role. Joseph was a steward under Pharoah with responsibility for all the country's produce in a time of famine. The leaders of the Jews throughout history and especially in the time of Jesus were referred to as stewards, responsible to God for the people of God. Essentially a steward is someone in a position of responsibility looking after goods or people in place of someone more important. The expectation is that the steward will keep whatever he is responsible for in good order and deliver them later as they were received, or even better than that. The criticism of the Jewish leadership was that they were failing to keep God's people well, and indeed were misrepresenting God to them, often for their own prestige and power - not at all what a steward was supposed to do.

Stewarding, or rather stewardship, has often been a major part of the Church as well. The stewardship for which the central church has often asked, is in relation to the financial and fabric wellbeing of the church. We have had expectations put upon us that we raise our monies and look after the property as good stewards. However, I am wondering (aloud) whether there is a higher expectation wanted of us by God.

We appear to be happier maintaining the ways things have always been, unwilling or unable to move into the future with God. It is of course good to support what has always been, because it is the way we know, the way we were brought up, and we are comfortable with it. However, in the story of the three stewards (the parable of the talents), Jesus gives two of the stewards into a row for simply returning what was given to them, while the one who returned more than was given was amply rewarded.

We continue to struggle to advance the Mure Access Project, which is not just a maintaining of the building, but opening up the building to be more accessible not only to the physically disabled, but also to young children in prams for our pre-five agenda. Once again the debate centred around the replacement of our organist with a Musical Director has re-awakened the exclusion in worship of those who like to sing with a more contemporary musical agenda.

Can we set aside our own comfort with the way things are and look to worship, fellowship and service more appropriate to present and future generations? Can we find ways of appreciating visitors to the congregation stepping out of their comfort zone by coming into our church, without finding ways to criticise their behaviour, dress or language? Can we be stewards of all that God has given us and offer back to him even more than he gave us?

I do so hope we are up for the challenge!

The following is a letter which I have received from the Presbytery Clerk

The Lodging House Mission is a lifeline for some of the city's most vulnerable people. It is open Monday to Friday, and on average sees 100 homeless, vulnerable and socially excluded people on a daily basis. In the winter months the night shelter opens at LHM from 1st December, and this year LHM would like to extend their opening hours to include a Saturday, allowing people to use the space instead of leaving the building at 7.30am with nowhere to go until the shelter reopens at night. The existing staff and volunteers work tirelessly at LHM and, like many charities, they are always grateful to have more individuals volunteering, as you can see from our

Presbytery website which often has information on volunteering for LHM. LHM have thought about the different ways they could extend the have developed service and a unique opportunity to allow congregations to directly support LHM: they're asking congregations to arrange a team of volunteers to allow the service to operate on Saturdays (separate from any individuals who already volunteer on weekdays). They need four people from 9am-3pm to volunteer with a LHM staff member who will be responsible for the overall running of the day. The six hours per person can be shared by two people who choose to split the hours or it can be one person, that is a choice for congregations to make. They hope to have support from at least 12 congregations to volunteer their time for this vital service for vulnerable and often excluded people. 12 congregations working together with LHM would mean that a congregation would only need to commit to one Saturday every 12 weeks to make a huge impact on the lives of people in their city. Six hours from a congregation's time would allow this service to support people for an extra day every week. What would you be

doing? You would help with breakfast and lunch and clearing away dishes. You would also be engaging with the service users and would, of course, be supported by a LHM staff member.
