**John 8:12**  
**"I am the light of the world.**  
**He who follows Me shall not walk in**  
**darkness,**  
**but have the light of life."**

Dear Friends,  
This verse from John's Gospel often comes to my mind at this time of year. The summer is past, the nights are drawing in, and we have before us the prospect of four months or so of limited day light.

This image of Light and Darkness is a theme which runs through the whole of Scripture and is an image which might simply be seen as....  
Light = Good and Darkness = Bad

Many of the very familiar, often quoted, passages in scripture are concerned with Light:

The very first verses of the Bible tell of God creating light and then separating the light from the darkness to make Day and Night

The prophet Isaiah used the contrast of light and darkness as he looked forward to the coming of God's Messiah....

**Isaiah 9:2 The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light.**

**Isaiah 49:6** speaks of God's Messiah as '**a light to the Gentiles**'

**Isaiah 60:1** commands '**Arise, shine; For your light has come! and the glory of the Lord is risen upon you**'.

In the New Testament we continue to find images of light and darkness:

At the start of John's Gospel, Jesus' life is identified as, '**the light of men**' **John 1:4** and there is also the powerful declaration in **1Peter 2:9** that we have been **called out of darkness into God's marvellous light**

So when Jesus proclaimed....**"I am the light of the world. He who follows Me shall not walk in darkness, but have the light of**

**life."**.... He was declaring Himself to be the fulfilment of these and many other prophecies.

Jesus came bringing the Light of Life to all who would receive Him.

Jesus made this declaration in the temple at Jerusalem on the Last day of the Festival of Tabernacles.

This festival took place at the time of the winter equinox and was a time when the people remembered God's many promises regarding light as they looked towards the darkness of winter

God had promised them His light for guidance, and for the revelation of His truth and God had promised that His light would be borne by His servant – His Messiah -- who would be the eternal light for the whole world.

At the Festival of Tabernacles there were torch light processions through the streets and giant lamp stands were set up in the temple to give light to all of Jerusalem during the hours of darkness to symbolise the eternal light of God.

And it was, that as Jesus stood in the temple beside these lamp stands, He declared Himself to be the Light -- not just of Jerusalem -- but of the whole World

He was the promised light of God.  
He was the servant mentioned in Isaiah who would bear light to the Gentiles.... and all of God's prophecies of light were fulfilled in Him.

Many people, as we know, dismissed Jesus' claims and continued to walk in darkness; but as the darkness of winter draws in around us, I pray that we might all welcome Jesus Christ as the true light of the world and have Him as the light of our lives.

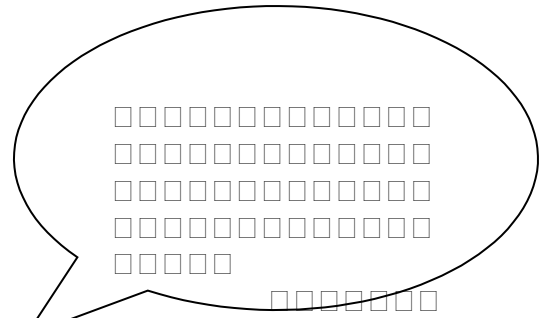

On behalf of the members of the Nominating Committee, I would like to express our thanks for all the support, prayers and words of encouragement which you have given us over the past two and a half years.

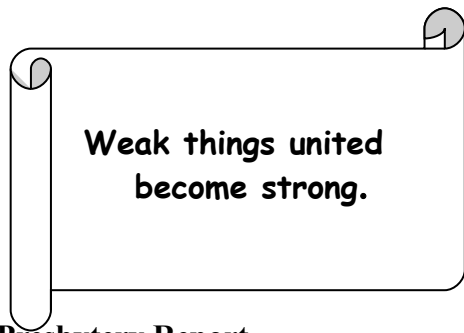

## Presbytery Report

At the first meeting after the summer break, Presbytery welcomed some new members. These included the Revd Dr Graham Blount and his wife the Revd Sheila Blount. Dr Blount has recently been inducted to St Enoch's Hogganfield. We also welcomed Mr Gus Mackay who has been appointed as Chaplain at the Lodging House Mission

The Presbytery Council gave notice that they want to make some changes relating to Manses. This has arisen because of some recent problems where congregations have called a minister and the manse had not been ready for occupancy or, in one case, not yet built. The proposals are that no leave to call will be granted until the Property Committee of Presbytery signs off that the congregation have a suitable, compliant manse and that the congregation have a satisfactory plan in place to bring the property up to a condition suitable for a new incumbent to move in, prior to the induction.

At the June meeting of Presbytery, it was agreed to suspend the Presbytery Plan until the September meeting. It is now proposed that a new Strategy Advisory Group be set up, which should be given the remit of conducting an immediate review of the Presbytery Plan, under the instruction of the General Assembly, using the numbers outlined by the Ministries Council in their report to the 2010 General Assembly. The Revd Graham Finch, who is Convener of the

Ministries Council, explained that the current number of Ministerial posts within Glasgow Presbytery is 163. It is intended that this should be cut by the equivalent of 31.4 full time posts by 2014.

He said that the basic reason for the review of the Presbytery Plan was that the last round of planning was carried out with no knowledge of the costs involved. We now have a grasp of the costs, and that is why this whole issue has been brought before the General Assembly. During the discussions relating to the various proposals, it was suggested that we cannot continue with unrestricted tenure, as this does not allow for the flexibility which will be required, if we are to reduce our numbers to the required level by 2014. A proposal was made that the Strategy Advisory Group should write to all ministers and charges within Glasgow Presbytery asking them to offer up their tenure to discussion as part of the review process. This was carried.

The Communications Committee asked the meeting to note the remit from the General Assembly which urged all congregations to support and promote the Kirk's monthly magazine, Life and Work.

The Ecumenical Relations Committee reported that Glasgow Churches Together would like to encourage churches to celebrate St Andrew's Day as an opportunity to proclaim a common witness to the people of their respective parishes. It is hoped to provide an event in the city area which people can attend if there is no local event.

Presbytery affirmed their delight for the Roman Catholic Community as they

welcomed Pope Benedict XVI to the City of  
Glasgow.

## Our Harvest Collection

The Kirk Session has decided to donate this year's Harvest Collection to Christian Aid's Pakistan Flood Disaster Appeal.

Monsoon rains sweep across Pakistan each year, but this year the rains have been stronger and more intense than usual, causing the worst floods for 80 years. The extent of the damage is severe, and the floods have destroyed communities - demolishing entire villages, roads and bridges and ruining fields and crops and killing livestock.

Throughout Pakistan, farming and animal rearing is the main source of income for many, so the loss of livestock and farm land will have major long-term consequences.

Christian Aid has sent £750,000 to help Act Alliance partners respond to the devastating floods that have killed more than 1,600 people.

Act Alliance partners will provide food, shelter and medical assistance to around 230,000 people in Balochistan, Khyber Paktunkwa, Punjab and Sindh provinces. Reports vary, but current estimates suggest that in excess of 20 million people in Pakistan have been affected.

Your donations will help make a difference to the people of Pakistan whose homes and livelihoods have been destroyed in what the UN is describing as the worst natural disaster since the 2004 Indian Ocean Tsunami.

In these days of dire reality the nation is crying out for an active religion, a Christianity that calls up for active service every believer. The Church has a great task before it in preserving the welfare of the individual and of the community and the Church must not fail in this respect. Amid the pressing needs of our defence in these days we must never lose sight of the armour of the soul. No nation can endure if it neglects the power that is given by God, the "Power that cometh from on High." "The nation that will not serve God will perish."
