Friends,

Having spent a month on the Isle of Coll, reading, walking, golfing, relaxing and reflecting, I also returned to my last profession as a Hairdresser. Every year I come here, I end up cutting lots of hair. I came to realise in speaking to some folk who use the Island as a form of escapism, that they have never visited church and are often the first to ask me questions about faith. This may well be because there is not a permanent Minister on Coll and they have to rely on visiting Clergy during the Summer Months.

Sometimes people get faith confused with certainty. It says that faith is the assurance of things hoped for. It does not say that faith is a clear as day certainty. We get confused between our faith in the vision and our faith in the God who gives the vision.

God offers us so many promises if we will respond in discipleship; salvation, resurrection, eternal life, fulfilment, wholeness, reconciliation, etc. But it is God that we need to grow to know, not the details of the promises.

I get bored out of my wits by people who want to argue about what heaven is like, or about what life after death will be like, or even about what the new creation will be like, because most of it doesn't matter. What matters is that we trust God, and follow the signposts God puts before us.

You see I don't believe in God because he promises me good things, I believe there will

be good things because I trust in God. Faith is not the certainty about what we will find at the end of life's journey, it is the belief in the goodness of God that assures us that the journey will be worthwhile.

We are people who worship together and pray together and work together to bring Christ's love and healing to those who need it. We have a bigger vision of a world where God's will is done on earth as in heaven, and our society and the whole world are characterised by love, mercy, peace and justice.

God has given us a sense of direction, and a sense of destination. Our faith is shown in our willingness to embark on a journey in that direction. The concept of worship groups and mission groups and all the other things congregations discuss and decide about is all very well on paper; however we need to take the step of faith that starts living them.

What is constant is the God we serve, made known to us in Christ, and experienced among us in the Spirit. It is in God that we put our faith, not in any promise or any structures or any short term vision. For no matter how clear a vision may seem to us now, a bit further down the road we will see that we only had part of it, or maybe we weren't even seeing straight. But our faith is in God and God leads us on.

Because we keep travelling forward in faith, because we keep searching and hoping for the fulfilment of the vision of what is to come, therefore God is not ashamed to be called our God.

We receive God's approval as we take each faltering step in obedience to the Spirit's leading and in pursuit of the glimpses of the vision that God has given us. Christian faith is not about taking Jesus into our heart, or about opening the door to let Jesus in. It is about opening the door and going out and letting Jesus take us places.

Here in this community at home that is something we do together. On Coll during Winter, services are locally led by the Session Clerk and other Elders, and the Interim Moderator may go out once a month. There are quite a few people on Coll ready to take this step, this leap of Faith, so I would ask that you remember them in prayer as they come to know the love of Jesus in their lives.

I've told them being a member of church is not a goal or a destination. It is taking a leap of Faith as they set out on the journey. I pray we are people of whom God is not ashamed, because we hunger and thirst for God's love, peace and justice in the world as we follow Christ in seeking its fulfilment.

Gift Day

At recent Board meetings our treasurer, Stuart Mckibbin, has highlighted the considerable reduction in income which we are experiencing during the current year. At the end of July, our cumulative income had decreased by 11% compared with the same period in 2014. If this were to continue until December we would see a deficit of £6500/£7000 for the whole year.

The Finance Committee always budgets to show a balanced position at the end of each

year but, clearly, this will not be achieved on this occasion.

In an effort to avoid such a situation in December, the Board has decided that we should hold a Gift Day to give members the opportunity to make an additional contribution towards church funds. This will be held on Saturday, 31st October, between 10am and noon. Tea and coffee will be provided and our minister, Malcolm Cuthbertson will be Donations will also attendance. be welcome on Sundays following the event. Envelopes, specifically for the Gift Day, will be available before and on the 31st October.

Our situation has been further exacerbated because, since that Board meeting, our boiler has broken down and will require to be replaced, incurring unexpected expenditure of almost £5000. As you will appreciate, this job has to be undertaken immediately to ensure that our building is adequately heated during the approaching winter.

Our last Gift Day, held in November 2013, raised the magnificent total of £6827 which included £1140 from the Gift Aid scheme and the Finance Committee feels it necessary to seek once again your generous support to enable us to adequately look after the church's assets.

Musical Afternoon

a selection of Organ and Piano music in the church on the afternoon of Sunday 25th October at 3.00 pm. All proceeds will go to a group called Venture Medical UK. They are planning a trip to Nepal next April and their aim is to take medical supplies and offer medical training to the local people to enable them to cope in times of disaster such as the dreadful earthquake which the area experienced this year.

Presbytery Report

We have had to find a new meeting place as major rot problems have been found in Govan and Linthouse Church and so for the remainder of this year our meetings will be held in Sherbrooke St Gilbert's whose minister, the Rev Tom Pollock, is the Moderator this year.

The Business Committee intimated that the Overture amending the Ministers and Deacons in Civil Partnerships Act which was sent down to Presbyteries from the General Assembly, will be discussed at our December meeting.

They also raised the question of Strategic Spending. For some time, a sum of 3% of Ministry and Mission Contributions from charges in the Presbytery has been made available to Presbytery. This was used to share across all the charges in Presbytery to help Ministry Mission reduce the and Contributions, but the central church then put restrictions on its use and, more recently, it has been used to reduce the contributions for charges struggling financially, to support Creative Outreach through a special fund and to write off shortfalls in certain circumstances. This year, the sum increased to 4% and next year it will rise to 5%, an additional amount of some £120,000 making around £300,000 in total in 2016. While there are restrictions on how this can be spent, it is intended to allow an element of decision making to be devolved to Presbytery. The Business Committee had considered various options, and brought three to Presbytery for their consideration. All the options are intended to support and develop

the work of the church within the Presbytery. The first was to make more funding available for Creative Outreach and review the criteria for grants from it. This fund is to help congregations to start new missional initiatives such as church planting or community engagement.

The second was to offer more Funding for Presbytery-wide Support Staff and provide extra paid support for congregations in specific areas, such as

- Advice for treasurers
- Extra time for buildings officers to enable deeper inspections and improve prevention of rot, etc
- More youth work support
- Funding application advice
- Local Church Review support

The third option was to make more funding available to create three new full-time posts within Presbytery to be allocated to support congregations, groupings, or areas.

A decision will be made at the October meeting.

The Community Responsibility
Committee brought a report on Funeral
Poverty. The cost of funerals has recently
been highlighted in the media. These costs
have soared by 80% in the last 10 years
while at the same time Government Grants
have dwindled. This can cause great
distress to families or individuals who get
into debt to pay for what they consider a
'decent' funeral for a loved one or even a
distant relative or friend. Funeral packages

can be expensive and confusing and it is extremely difficult to challenge costs in the emotional crisis of any bereavement. Many organisations, including the Church of Scotland, are coming together to try to address the situation. The Fair Funeral Campaign was set up in 2014 to invite Funeral Directors to sign up to offering a more affordable package and to clearly display all costs. The committee wished to highlight this situation and encourage congregations to ask their local Funeral directors if they are aware of this campaign and encourage them to sign the 'Fair Funeral Pledge'. Consideration could also be given as to how congregations could perhaps provide practical as well as emotional support to anyone in the community e.g.in keeping the costs down by providing a Funeral Tea in the church hall, or a car to transport folks to the funeral.

So, four months in post and what is the not so new Children, Young People and Family Worker doing with his time? As a result of the Holiday Club, two groups have been identified, and these groups will both be started when you come to read this. The first group is an 18-30ish fellowship group. We meet once a month for social events and our first two meetings have involved going out for dinner and playing crazy golf. It is open to anyone in the 18-30ish age bracket and I'm happy to pass on details of when we meet. The other group to come from the Holiday Club is a Youth Fellowship. This started on Sunday 4th October and is open to any young person S1-S6. We meet in the church hall on a Sunday evening 7-9pm. We start each evening with a Bible reflection, then the rest of the evening is socialising and fellowship. Come along to find out more. My hope is the Youth Fellowship will feed into the 18-30ish group, which will then feed into the leadership of the church.

Within the church I have now visited all the youth organisations in the church. The first thing that has struck me is the dedication of the volunteers in all the organisations. They deserve

tremendous praise for the unstinting work they do within the church. Everyone that helps shows tremendous dedication to the young people in their care, and this is a fantastic base to build from here at Mure Memorial Church.


Outside the church, I have been busy in schools. After the October school break there will be a Scripture Union Group in Garrowhill Primary on Thursday lunchtime. This will be open to any child in P6-P7 initially, but if there is a demand, I'll certainly look at setting up similar groups for younger pupils. At Bannerman High I have got involved in setting up the Scripture Union Group there. It is open to any pupil in S1-S3 and is on a Wednesday lunchtime. At the moment we have 6 young people who have attended the group, so this gives great hope to build this group in the future.
