Dear Friends

Doubt, disillusionment, discouragement and despair, are emotions that are common to all of us at some point in our lives. Loss of a job, loss of a loved one, divorce, illness, any of these things and more can throw us into a tailspin and fill our hearts with anxiety and fear. We think that things will never be right again.

Especially in the middle of the night, things seem at their very worst. We forget that there ever was a thing called hope, and all that we have learned about God's saving grace is nowhere to be found. If ever we knew how to call upon God, it is now only a distant memory from a better and happier time, and even when we need God the most, we turn our backs on God and walk away.

That is exactly the situation in which we find the disciples. Followers of Jesus, they had believed in the new life he had promised them. Their hearts were filled with joy and anticipation as they looked forward to hearing more of his word, and to being witnesses again and again to his good works, to his miracles.

Fed in body, mind, and spirit by their fellowship with Jesus and with other believers, their lives had become filled with a new joy, and even all they had to give up to follow him was as nothing compared to what they now had. They thought it would go on forever.

All their hopes and dreams ended with the crucifixion and burial of Jesus, it had beaten every last shred of hope from them. They thought there was nothing left to do but pick up the pieces of their former lives and begin again, to turn their backs on all that had seemed so expectant and hopeful.

Don't we all do that? If we've lost something, don't we keep revisiting the same spot, thinking that if we go there often enough, the lost item will miraculously appear?

One of the most wonderful things to come out of the resurrection is that we learn this about Jesus, no matter how bad things become for us, no matter where we go to hide ourselves when the world gets to be too much for us, even if we lose our faith for a time, He will come to be with us.

He won't ask us for explanations, we won't have to justify our position, and there will be no recriminations.....He will simply meet us as we walk, or it may be in a car that is taking us away from those things we can no longer endure, as we try to walk off the results of that recent medical test that took us completely by surprise.

Whatever route we take, when we can't take it anymore, Jesus will meet us there. Even though it is us who are going away, he is always faithful. He comes to the disappointed, the doubtful.

He comes to those who have given up and are headed home, which makes this whole story about the blessedness of being broken. This should not surprise us. Jesus' entire ministry was centred on those who needed him the most, the poor, the sick, the blind.

Wherever he found them, he shared not only his love, but whatever else he had, until finally he shared his broken body as well.

God uses everybody to proclaim His kingdom, not only when we are good, faithful and true, but even in our moments of faithlessness.

Just as he made himself known to the disciples, and used them to make his story and the news of his resurrection known to the world, so he comes and stands beside us in our moments of despair, calling our name, waiting for us to recognize Him, to realize again the truth of his words, to be renewed in faith so that he can use us again.

In countless ways, Jesus comes among us, never demanding, but patiently waiting for us to open our eyes and see him. We have only to be willing to have our eyes opened in faith, so that we can see the Risen Christ for ourselves, so we can feel his presence and his peace as they surround us.

Wherever we are on our life journey, pray that when the Risen Lord comes to us, our eyes may be opened so we can see him in all his glory, and then, renewed in faith, tell others the Good News.



Presbytery Report

We opened our first meeting after the summer break by celebrating the Sacrament of Communion during our opening Worship. We welcomed three new minsters who had been inducted over the summer to Lenzie Old, Giffnock Orchardhill and Eastwood and paid tributes to three ministers who had passed away over the summer, the Rev May Allison, the Rev Dr Moyna McGlynn and the Rev James Simpson and to Jean Morrison, who was the Presbytery Elder for Shettleston Old for many years.

We had two invited speakers. The first was the Rev David McCarthy who is the Church of Scotland Development Officer for Fresh Expressions, whose job it is to support and encourage the work of the church in developing new ways of being church. He works with churches to find new ways of engaging with our communities, listening to what they have to say, sometimes allowing them to voice their discontent. It does not involve asking people to come to where we are and it is not a means of increasing our numbers, but it is a way of showing the love of God. It has been up and running within the Church of England and the Methodist Church for several years and has resulted in the planting of new congregations and churches which have a different style from the church which planted it rather than cloning something which is already established and works well elsewhere. There will be an opportunity to find out more at an event to be held on 19th October at Renfield St Stephen's Church, but booking is required. If you are interested, please speak to me and I can give you further information.

The second speaker was Mrs Val Brown who is the Vice Convener of the World Mission Council, who spoke about the effect of climate change, which is making world poverty permanent. She spoke about the problems caused by flash floods which occurred after people have planted their seeds to grow their much needed crops. It is the poorest people in the world who are paying the highest price. It is essential that we reduce our carbon emissions and she challenged everyone to wrestle with our own lifestyles.

The Business Committee reported that the Community Responsibility Committee have been made aware of cuts in provision of Elderly Care in some parts of the Presbytery. They have been in contact with Glasgow City Council about this, but congregations are asked to pass any information to the Presbytery Office, if they are aware of any cuts in their area.

Fiona Crawford, the Presbytery Strategic Planning Officer, gave a report on a recent planning meeting which had decided to adopt as a strategic theme for our work, 'Supporting Congregations to be People of the Way'. This was the theme of this year's General Assembly. She started by giving us some figures. There are 127 congregations within Glasgow Presbytery, 111 Ministers, Ministry Development Staff, (that includes people like Douglas), several locally employed staff, who are paid by the local congregation and 8 Presbytery Employees. There are 15 Presbytery Committees who work to cover the various aspects of the work of Presbytery. From these figures, it is obvious that scale is an issue and most members of congregations do not recognise themselves as a part of Presbytery. It was hoped that, as a Presbytery, we would work to be more visible, accountable, pro-active and supportive of congregations through stronger communication, greater engagement and commitment.

The Strategic Planning Committee asked Presbytery to approve the appointment of Roland Hunt to the linked charge of Carmyle and Kenmuir Mount Vernon as an Ordained Local Minister. Roland has been working with the congregations as a Reader since the beginning of the year, but will now be ordained. Once we know a date, we will intimate it for anyone who might wish to attend his Service of Ordination

The Community Responsibility Committee had invited Hazel Watson, the Convener of the Scottish Churches Anti-Human Trafficking Group to speak. She shared some examples of people who had been caught up in human trafficking and explained that the group are looking for support to enable spiritual befriending for women who have been trafficked, but have now been released and want to attend church or have someone with whom to pray.

The Learning and Nurture Committee invited a delegate from the National Youth Assembly to give a report. One of the main topics which they had discussed had been mental health issues and the need to remove the stigma attached to it.

The World Mission Committee intimated that Christian Aid Scotland has launched an emergency appeal for Malawi to help support communities through a devastating drought that has left 6.5 million people without access to food. The first £70,000 will be matchfunded by the Scottish Government. To donate you can visit www.christianaid.org.uk/emergiencies/malawi-food-crisis.
