

Dear friends,

Just a few lines to keep you up to speed with the Ministry here in Mure Memorial and Baillieston St Andrew's.

Firstly I would like to thank each of you for the warm welcome I have received from both congregations over the last 6 months, you have all allowed me to feel very much at home among you and this has been very important as Malcolm and I are really striving to let it be known this is a team Ministry, hence the reason we have been sharing the worship in both churches. We are setting out to achieve exactly what the Gospel of Christ is all about, reaching out to everyone with eyes to see and ears to hear.

I know from sharing with you all that, as a group of Christians within the community of Garrowhill and Baillieston, you seek to accept and value individuals as they are, enabling them to recognise their self worth and encouraging them to achieve their full potential.

Christ-like principles form the cornerstone of all the church's work, services and facilities and underpin our determination to ensure that involvement in the whole area is a positive and enjoyable experience for all. Our approach strives to be enabling, empowering, supportive and outward-looking.

However once the team ministry is well enough recognised and established, the plan is that we will lead worship separately and alternatively in both churches, whether this will be weekly, fortnightly or monthly has still to be arranged, as we have to think about Baptisms, Weddings, etc.

The east end of Glasgow is an area with a wonderful community spirit, even though it suffers from bad press at times. People are ever so friendly, and this brings me to the essence of addressing you as friends, as Christ called us no longer slaves, but friends.

At this point I would share the role of the welcoming team, who meet everyone coming into both Churches on a Sunday morning, they are doing a wonderful job in their Ministry.

However, this leads me into a story which happened in another Church, so I thought I would relate it to you.....

The Session Clerk went to the Minister to say he felt there was a lack of friendliness among members of the congregation and that people were reluctant to greet one another in church. Eventually the Minister agreed with him and said he would devise a plan to change things.

During service the next Sunday, the Minister described the situation to the congregation and said that the following Sunday they would have a brief pause to allow parishioners to turn to those seated around them and greet them with a friendly hello.

After the service, one man turned around to the woman behind him and said, "Good morning." She looked at him in shocked indignation and snapped, "That doesn't start until next Sunday!" The truth is some folk aren't ready to be friends of either God or us but, regardless of their choice, we are called to be friends to them, to choose to act in love not only towards those who love us, but to outcasts, to the lowest and least in society, to drug addicts, to the homeless, to elderly people who need help to take care of themselves, and of course to our neighbours in the seats around us in the Church, no matter how grumpy he or she may be.

Remember my friends, God has chosen us to be his friends, despite the fact you and I at the first, did not choose him. Let us therefore choose, as he asks of us, to be friends to others, regardless of what they think or what they do.

Love each other with the kind of love Christ refers to, you know the kind of love I mean. It is the love that goes beyond what seems right according to the letter of the law and enters into the Spirit of what God wants for us, the love that enters into feeding others, into healing others, into showing grace to others, into giving peace to others, the love that values others, regardless of who they are or what they have or have not done.

Badminton Club





Presbytery Report

Members who were new to Presbytery were welcomed to our first meeting after the summer break.

The Business Committee reported that Chris Macrae had resigned from his post as Strategy Officer over the summer and it was agreed that we should express our sincere thanks to him for all his hard work, especially in helping to draw up and finalise the Presbytery Plan.

It was agreed that a special meeting of Presbytery should be held to discuss the overture sent down from the General Assembly relating to Ministers and Deacons in Civil Partnerships. It was planned to have presentations for and against the overture followed by discussion and a vote.

The Education Committee reported on the changing ethnic demographic across the school pupil population within Glasgow.

Over the last three years there had been an overall increase in the proportion of pupils from ethnic minority backgrounds which is reflective of the increase across Scotland as a whole. In Primary, 20.1% come from an ethnic minority background compared with 6.8% nationally. In Secondary, 15.1% come from an ethnic minority background compared with a national figure of 4.9%. 17% of all Primary pupils have English as a second language – an increase of 1.5% in the past three years. In Secondary the figure is 15%.

The Education Committee are recommending that chaplains in schools might consider offering to help with any groups designed to assist pupils needing help with speaking English.

The Learning and Nurture Committee had invited Presbytery's Youth Development Coordinator, Catherine Falconer to give a report on this year's Youth Assembly.

They had heard reports of the variety of worship which is on offer in various congregations across the country. In some, young people were going out to visit the older members.

There had been much discussion about the problems in the Middle East and questions raised about how we, as the Church of Scotland, can offer help.

There were several guest speakers including the Moderator and a representative from CrossReach who had spoken about the work which they do at Perth Prison.

The Mission Committee reported on an application which had been received from Wellington Parish Church for a grant from the Creative Outreach Fund. This fund was established to help congregations start new missional initiatives with a view to creating a new worshipping community either in conjunction with, or independent from existing congregations. Grants of up to £10,000 per year can be given to self-supporting congregations for an initial period of three years to meet 50% of the staffing costs with the congregation raising the other 50%.

Wellington Church is planning to develop worship, teaching, discussion groups and pastoral care with and for the student community, building on work that is already being done by the congregation. The project is supported by the university Chaplain and, ultimately it is hoped to create a studentbased congregation.

The Mission Committee were recommending that approval should be given and Presbytery agreed to this.

The Oaks Care Home, Glasgow Rd The community council committee were invited to a preview at the above Home, and myself & four others attended.

The Home is excellently appointed, and the rooms are well furnished. There are two different types of accommodation, one type is bedroom only and the others are apartments, furnished with a cooker and fridge, both have en suite bathrooms. There is also a common room fitted out with a centrally placed cooking island and with a fridge & washing up area.

The emphasis is on rehabilitation of vulnerable adults aged 18 - 65 with a

range of mental health issues such as anxiety, depression and brain injuries, helping them rebuild the confidence and life skills they need to lead as independent lives as possible.

Residents will be admitted on an individual basis, following a thorough assessment involving the local health and social care services.

It is anticipated that these residents will be short term only, with a minimum stay to help them achieve their goal of self support.

Many may return to supported community living or be able to live independently, while others may continue to need extra care or assistance.

Some will be allowed shopping expeditions under supervision.

The internal layout and security arrangements have been well designed.

We would, however, ask that you return the form via the church so that the gift is included as part of our church's project.

The committee have a number of other fund-raising ideas for throughout the year

and we are excited by the prospect of how much we can do to help these self-help groups in Ethiopia. We now have a space on the wall in the Main Hall and intend to use it to keep you all informed.

Finally, and most importantly, we would ask you to remember all Connected Church projects in your prayers, but, especially the work with the Kale Heywet Church.


