Dear Friends

It was in the month of September 1997 that Mother Theresa would die. She was an excellent example of service to the poorest of the poor in India in the last chapter of her life. As we start a new session in the church's life I thought there were a couple of quotes from her that were worth reflecting on.

"being unwanted is the most terrible disease a human being can suffer"

And on dying, "when you die, the Lord will not ask how much you have done with your life, but how much love you have put into the doing."

Organisations and activities in church and community all start back after the summer break. It is an opportunity to welcome new people to them. There should be no-one in our family, church or community who should need to feel unwanted, and certainly no church activity should be closed to those who want to be part of it.

It doesn't matter how little anyone has to offer or how insignificant they may feel, because, like the proverbial cog in the machine, the cog can be the difference between whether it works or not. As the church we can never fully realise being the Body of Christ as long as there is a human being outside of our community, because what they have to offer, and indeed who they are, is missing, like a jigsaw piece from the picture that is Christ.

The challenge for those of us who are part of the church is not so much to get things done, but to ensure that it is done in the most loving of ways. That means giving less attention and priority to our own agendas, and ensuring that the people who are not part of our regular activities are made to feel welcome, made to feel a part of what is going on and even given the opportunity to participate, making a contribution to our fellowship, worship and service.

It also means as Mother Theresa said that what we do is not done out of self-interest, and the keeping of status or power, but rather in loving service to others. This is not only at the individual level, but at all levels of the church community. People are now largely of the opinion that we, the church, are out for keeping the church going, looking for more money and more members. It is surely beyond the time when we show them the love of Christ irrespective of what they may offer the church. While Mother Theresa is a great example to all of us of loving service, she would have no qualms about highlighting the sacrifice of Jesus, in His loving service. For it was while we were still wicked/enemies/helpless that Christ died for us. (Romans 5 v 6 - 11).

Hope you're back to make your unique contribution to the church, feeling refreshed after the summer break. Yours.

From Douglas Robertson

Firstly, I would like to thank everyone for their warm welcome as I begin my journey as Children's, Young People and Family Worker here. It has been a total sea change from my previous job, where I was supporting adults with learning disabilities in the community. I live in Bishopbriggs where I usually worship at Springfield Cambridge Church. There I am a serving member of the Congregational Board and Kirk Session. I grew up in the church and have been heavily involved in the Sunday School, Bible Class and Boys' Brigade. Scripture Union Camps have also had a huge influence in my faith journey. In my spare time I enjoy sports, mainly playing and watching football and golf. I am also a bit of a petrol head & enjoy driving!

One of the main questions I have been asked since I started this job is, what is my vision for the youth work in the church. My dad's side of the family originates from Neilston, which is a large farming community and this perhaps has an influence on my vision. For I see all youth work in the church as seed planting. Whether a young person has contact with the church through school assemblies, a uniformed organisation, the Sunday School or any other form of youth work, then my aim is not to convert the young person, for that is not our job. So how can people help with youth work? The biggest way people can help is through prayer! There is a big challenge in engaging with young people in any community, and this will not be done on our strength alone. But if you feel you can help serve young people, then please come speak to me! I'm always looking for volunteers! Be that from opening a tin of hot dogs to being fully responsible for a group or somewhere in-between, I'd be delighted to hear from you!


My one disappointment is that more of you do not join us in the choir: practices are held on Tuesdays at 7.30pm.

From Kale Heywet Church

Grace and peace be with you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. We thank God for you all the time. Because of your support and prayers people are being empowered, learning to be self-sufficient, providing more nutritious food for their family and communities are being transformed.

HIGHLIGHTS AND CHALLENGES

It is a joy to see the transformation of Self Help Group members and their families in every aspect of their lives. Working through local churches enables us to serve the whole person. It is also much easier for us to mobilize thousands of people than non-church-based organisations. Because of the harmony and love among members of different faiths in the SHG, people are coming to Christ without any preaching. In a town where 32 groups were recently established, nine people have accepted Christ as their Saviour.

"You must be joking"

Abebech Game'a lives in a noisy, shanty area on the outskirts of Hawassa, a large city 271 km south of Addis Ababa. She is married and has 8 children: 4 girls and 4 boys. Abebech used to move from one shanty house to another because she couldn't afford to pay regular rent. Whilst pregnant with twins she prayed in desperation for God to provide a home. God heard and answered her prayer. Someone saw her situation and gave her space in his compound where she assembled a plastic house.

'That was one of the biggest miracles of my life. It was much better than being homeless and living on the streets which was where I was heading.'

Her husband worked as a daily labourer and Abebech tried things such as roasting

and selling corn on the roadside to support their family. But their combined income was hardly enough to feed their children even just one proper meal a day.

Abebech still remembers the first time the facilitators from Kale Heywet Church came to talk to her about Self Help Groups. 'They asked me, "What do you have?" and I replied, "I have myself and my children." To be honest, I thought they were going to give me something. When they told me about Self Help Groups and how I could change my life by saving small amounts, I thought they must be joking.' But eventually, she joined a Self Help Group called 'Andinet' which means 'Unity'.

During the first year, the group received training on saving and credit management, entrepreneurship and basic business skills. Later on they received training on other topics such as leadership, home and time management and communication skills.

Abebech's initial weekly saving was just 2p. But now she is saving a minimum of 33p a week. She was the first to borrow from her group and her first loan was £1.33. With this she bought 40 pieces of wood and new plastic and improved her house. She repaid her loan and with another one she bought a calf for £10.

When the cow gives birth to male calves she fattens and sells them for up to £90 each and she raises the female calves for milk. She upgraded her house to a mud house with tin roof and was able to buy some furnishings.

This is how she described the change...

'There were times when I couldn't afford to give my children even the smallest daily meal. You can imagine how heart breaking that is for a mother. But now, not only do they eat nutritious food but they eat until they are full. I can't express the gratitude and joy I feel when I hear my children say, 'I am full'. My older children passed through the darkest times of their lives with us but I am so glad the younger ones are not experiencing that.' Abebech's only regret is that she didn't know about Self Help Groups sooner and asks, 'Where would we be now if Self Help Groups were here long ago

Crawford, Helen and Gillian, would like to sincerely thank all friends and neighbours for their cards and messages of condolence. They brought great comfort and support to us and the rest of the family.
