I love Denise Levertov's poem "Overland to the Islands." The poet conjures up the image of a dog moving "intently haphazard" sniffing and dancing over rocks and mud, disdaining nothing his nose registers along the way.

But the dog has a trick afoot, which is that he always "keeps moving, changing pace and approach but no direction – every step an arrival."

It seems like yesterday, but fifteen months have passed since my family, and I arrived in Scotland. Our journey has been long. Sometimes the path was plain and easy, but on some occasions, it was frightening and full of turns in which we could not see anything until we make the turn.

During this process, I have been learning how to ask God good questions because the wrong question leads to the wrong answer. So, I do not ask God to show me the entire road ahead as it is impossible. We make the road by walking. Look! Walking, not running. So, in my case, the right question has been this: 'what is the next step, God?'

One of Thomas Merton's prayers has been very helpful to me. Let me share it with you:

My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going. I do not see the road ahead of me. I cannot know for certain where it will end. Nor do I really know myself, and the fact that I think I am following Your will does not mean that I am actually doing so. But I believe that the desire to please You does in fact please You. And I hope I have that desire in all that I am doing. I hope that I will never do anything apart from that desire. And I know that, if I do this, You will lead me by the right road, though I may know nothing about it. Therefore, I will trust You always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death. I will not fear, for You are ever with me, and You will never leave me to face my perils alone. Amen.

On different levels and perspectives my family and I can see God's hand guiding our lives, and as a result our hearts are full of gratitude since every step has been an arrival.

I hope my personal journey can illustrate our journey as part of God's people. Let's say thanks to God because he brought us here. Every step has been an arrival for both congregations. I don't know exactly where God is leading us, but I do believe we are moving forward.

At Easter, we celebrate the rising of new life and new possibilities. Let's celebrate the new possibilities that God is creating for all of us.

Below we have reports from some of the organisations and committees within both churches.

Property (@ St Andrews)

Baillieston St Andrews are still recovering from our Church fire in December 2021.

We have completed extensive renovations thanks to our insurance company and are on the path to becoming fully compliant with Scottish Fire and Rescue Service.

We have implemented several changes in how we approach fire safety, including new paperwork and relevant signage. This has been shared with other Church of Scotland Churches as good practice.

New Year New Project



Our project this year, is to continue our work with SFRS by installing an appropriate fire alarm system, including smoke detectors, fire doors and closers throughout our Church and adjoining hall. We arecurrently seeking donations and/or grants from local businesses to aid us in our mission.

LODGING HOUSE MISSION (@ Mure Memorial)

Many thanks to our congregation members who bought Christmas cards to raise funds for LHM and also those who made cash donations. In the late autumn two carloads of tins and packets of food were delivered after our Harvest Service with many other congregation members choosing to make cash donations.

LHM continues to be very busy during the winter months providing hot breakfasts and lunches for homeless people. They also provide many opportunities for education, training and leisure such as sports and music making and group outings. They provide a base for many statutory and third sector agencies from the health and social care sector to provide direct care to the homeless people and to offer support and advice. They also work in partnership with other homelessness services in Glasgow and do outreach work. LHM provides Chaplaincy services and provide opportunities for prayer and reflection and Bible Study.

LHM issues monthly newsletters on-line which are posted on our Church website.

RAINBOWS (@ Mure Memorial)

Rainbows started up again in September. We currently have 15 girls, 2 Adult Leaders, 2 Young Leaders and a Guide Helper. Girls can now enrol at the age of 4.

Rainbows are very energetic and lively, and they love playing games, especially when there is a lot of running around involved! However, they also like to be creative and enjoy concentrating while they colour in pictures and cut out shapes. They do craft work to make keepsakes or charts for themselves or gifts for others. Rainbows like to sing action songs and play miming games. As their Promise states Rainbows are encouraged to think about their beliefs, and to be kind and helpful. They have a programme of activities to follow, and they can now gain badges and awards. In their badge work this session they have been doing activities about looking after themselves and keeping healthy, thinking about their local community and how they can make the best of it and making suggestions about how to be eco-friendly at home and encourage their families to do likewise! They are now starting on the Traveller badge.

Recently the Rainbows celebrated Thinking Day (22 February) when they did activities from Guiding in other countries such as games, action songs and quizzes.

During Advent the Rainbows sang several traditional carols which they chose themselves as well as some more modern carols which the Leaders did not know!

Above all Rainbows just love coming together with their friends to play games and have fun, and they particularly like parties and celebrations!

We are hopeful that one day we will be able to start up our other Rainbow Unit but in the meantime the Rainbows are grateful to the Kirk Session and the congregation for their support and encouragement.

Girls' Brigade (@ Mure Memorial)

The 45th Glasgow company of the Girls Brigade continued to meet as a company throughout the lockdown periods via zoom. We held quizzes, made crafts, read Bible stories, and even held our Christmas parties and prizegiving 'virtually' via zoom.

It is lovely to be able to meet with our girls face to face again this session.

We currently have 23 Explorers, 16 Juniors and 9 Brigaders. These numbers include girls who were previously members of 95th Glasgow GB at St Andrews Church and who have transferred their membership to 45th Glasgow to continue their GB journey.

All sections have enjoyed craft activities, games and singing amid other activities.

The explorers have been doing activities based on the theme of 'the sea' and have learned about Noah and Jonah.

The juniors have learned about the History of The Girls' Brigade and have learned how to find a passage is the Bible having been given the book, chapter and verse.

The Brigaders have learned about helping to reduce the amount of plastic in the environment. They have made environmentally friendly bags and have been clearing litter from the area around the church. They have also studied the '3 meanings of the word present' including God's present/gift to us of His son Jesus. Our company has donated money and stationery items to Ukraine via the charity 'Glasgow the Caring City' and has donated a shoebox of items via the charity 'Operation Christmas Child.'

At Christmas we held a fundraising evening and raised £350 for Radio Clyde's Cash for Kids Appeal.

We are organising a Coffee Morning in Mure Memorial Church Hall on Saturday 22 April at 10am and are holding an end of session Parents Evening on Wednesday 17 May at 7pm.

Our company is pleased to announce the appointment of Mrs Sharon McKibbin as captain/leader in charge. We have also welcomed Molly McManus (formerly a member of 95th Glasgow) who has completed her induction training and is now serving as a leader in the 45th Glasgow. We currently have 2 young ladies working through the leadership training programme.

We were sorry when, during the pandemic, two of our long serving leaders indicated that they wished to retire from active service within the company. We give thanks for the dedicated service of Isobel Kirk (40+ years) and Myra McMillan (20+ years)

We also give thanks for the many dedicated years of service given by all GB Officers in 95th Glasgow Company.

We were saddened to learn of the death of Mrs Jean Russell and give thanks for her 50+ years of dedicated service to the 45^{th} Glasgow Girls' Brigade Company.

The Boys Brigade 111th Glasgow Company (@ St Andrews)

The Company finally resumed meeting normally in September 2022 after a period of disruption due to the COVID-19 pandemic. We had to cease meeting abruptly in March 2020. We did not meet again indoors until October 2021 when we could commence with several restrictions in place. Our meetings lasted until December 2021. We then took the decision to pause our meetings once again and we resumed in March 2022.

This disruption has unfortunately had a marked effect on the number of boys in the Company. As of now, we have six in the Anchor Boys Section, four in the Junior Section and two in the Company Section. These are the lowest numbers we have ever had in the history of the Company. Two members of Staff also left the Company during this time. Katrina Logan and Fiona Coventry sadly resigned, and we thank them for the years of service which they gave faithfully to the 111th Glasgow Company.

On a brighter note, two of our Senior Boys gained The Queen's Badge in 2020 and were finally presented with their awards last year. Rhys Kirkwood and Christopher McCluskey became the 57th and 58th recipients of The Queen's Badge in the history of the Company. We are proud of their great achievement in gaining the highest award in The Boys' Brigade. Due to the sad passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, it may be some time before there is a Queen's Badge in the BB.

Following on from their Queen's Badge success, Rhys and Christopher decided to make the commitment to become Officers. They successfully completed their Youth Leader Training in November last year and are now Lieutenants in the Company. We wish them a long and happy career in The Boys' Brigade.

As we attempted to resume our normal schedule of events, we held a short Presentation of Prizes in May last year. This evening was well attended by parents and family members with the highlight of the evening being the presentation of the two Queen's Badges. All members of the Company were also presented with the Queen's Platinum Jubilee commemorative BB badge.

It was nice to have a normal gathering of the Boys and their families again after such a long time.

In a similar vein the Company held our annual Dedication Service in the Old Church Hall on 13 October last year conducted by our Interim Minister at the time, Rev. Sandra Black. We were delighted to be able to hold this service after an absence of two years and formally re-dedicate our work towards the advancement of Christ's Kingdom amongst boys.

As we proceed with this ongoing session the Company held a fundraising evening on Thursday 16 March based on 'The Chase' TV quiz programme.

The Company is currently working towards our Parents Evening & Presentation of Prizes which will be held in May. Please keep the Company in your prayers and please spread the word to everyone that The Boys' Brigade is back open again in Baillieston and all Boys will be warmly welcomed on a Thursday evening.
